

Wagon Roads. The problem of good roads depends in every case upon local conditions and no general solution can be found. The broken stone road in the moist climate of France is an ideal road, but in the dry climate of northern Italy it becomss a dusty nuisance. The broken stone road may be well suited to the soil and climate of England, but who can foretell the effect of sticky Illinois mud on such a road? The principles and practices of France, England, Germany and Switzerland, although most excellent for those countries, are not necessarily applicable in this country. The wagon ways of the leading European countries represent the experience of centuries in road building, and the chief motive in the construction of many of them was military rather than commercial or social.
