Wagon Roads.
The problem of good roads depends in every case upon local conditions and no general solution can be found. The broken stone road in the moist climate of France is an ideal road, but in the dry climate of northern Italy it becomss a dusty nuisance. The broken stone road may be well suited to the soil and climate of England, but who can foretell the effect of sticky Illinois mud on such a road? The principles and practices of France, England, Germany and Switzerland, although most excellent for those countries, are not necessarily applicable in this country. The wagon ways of the leading European countries represent the experience of centuries in road building, and the chief motive in the construction
of many of them was military of many of them was military
rather than commercial or social. rather than commercial or social.
Those countries have a dense and comparitively wealthy pop ulation, an undulating surfac affording ready drainage, and an abundance of suitable material for constructing permanently good roads; while in the United States are immense areas having a sparse and comparitively poor population, without any gravel or broken stone suitable for road building purposes. Further, materially of the railroad has with reference to many of the European wagon roads.
The first inhabitants of this country were too fully occupied in subduing the wildnerness, establishing homes, opening farms to provide the necessaries of life, and setting up the framework of a government, to giv much sttention to the conven iences and comforts of trans-
portation; and hence their wagon roads were of the crudest, poorest sort. Later, just as an ex tension of the population to the opst was necessitated the devel portation, the introduction of the railroad made less important the wagon roads and engrossed the attention of the population
of the new territory. In a large part of the United States the railroad has been the pioneer and has rendered unnecessary long lines of wagon transporta
tion. At present this county is so well supplied with excellently managed railroads that the chie function of the wagon road is to afford easy communication and boring farms and between the farm and the nearest raifroa
station. Thus the problem o good roads has become a local
question both with respect to the question both with respect to the to the materials and the methods most suitable for use in the construction.
