FOR BETTER ROADS
One Miliion Dollars on Good Roads.
Actuated by the enthusiastic novement for good roads in Vir ginia, Congressman Otey of that state has introduced a bill in congress to appropriate $\$ 1$,000,000 to be expended unde direction of the secretary of ag. iculture in the building and maintaining of good roads throughout the United States. The work is to be done in each state and territory "on such
plans and specifications as the plans and specifications as the
secretary may adopt as being secretary may adopt as being
best fitted to secure permanent, best fitted to secure permanent, in the respective localities," the construction to proceed contem poraneously in all states and erritories as far as possible. Provision is made that after he government nas spent $\$ 1$ per capita in any state or territory, made until the work has been completed to that stage in all parts of the country. Thus, if the law went into effect, something like $\$ 500,000$ would b spent on roads in the state Washington, and when this amount was exhausted the work would stop until the $\$ 1$ per capita had been expended in all the other states.

Congressman Otey believes y the government would ble the porple to learn the best methods of good road making and perhaps induce states or mmunities to take up the werk f building improved highways. the bill is the better dissemination of knowledge by means of mail delivery to every door; to school attendance, and to promote more intimate interstate relations. The expenditure would be large, but Mr. Otey maintains that the people demand good roads as part com pensation for the burdens of taxation they bear, and putting several millions in good road will be as profitable an investment appropriating it for acquir ing outside work, for irrigation or for the improvement of

asking in the shade of said po basking in the shade of said po tato vines; the plaintiff's act in allowing the defendant's paris his flesh, instead of with the flesh of the lany bugs, was unmental and physicial suffering to which the plaintifi complains was the result of his own wrong in misapplying the defendant's paris green to purposes other paris green to purposes other
than those for which he was emthan those for which to apply it, and, besides, in damnum absque injuria; the plaintiff, in opening his clothe and exposing himself. to the ady bugs and paris green, wa guilty of contributory negli ence; the plaintiff knew as wel as the defendant that paris green was poisonous, and if he did not now that parisgreen was poison ous, then this suit should not
have been brought in his name, but by a committee appointed o represent him.
