

He is a Power in the Land, says H. M. Mayo of Louisiana.

Henry M. Mayo delivered an address on "Newspapers in Relation to Development" before the Louisiana Press Association, in the course of which he said:

"The average newspaper man represents an element that fre quently dominates by sheer force of will power and of argument, doing his level best to fill up the waste places, to create order out of chaos, to smooth out the wr:nkles of the body politic, and to render his every aid to the schemes, thoughts and projects of everybody else but himself.




