The spraying will be repeated until the ballast is thoroughly saturated. The result thus far is very satisfac tory. One may ride out on the back platform, while the train is making sixty miles an hour, and be practically free from annoyance by dust.
The Santa Fe engines in Cali fornia burn oil, and are cinder less. The absence of both dust and cinders makes railroad traveling in that almost rainless country a matter of enjoyment instead of the reverse. The disagreeable rides down the
