Early Kentucky Railroads.

The "Ellen N." affair recalls days of early railroading in Kenwicky, notes an old timer in a New York paper. Forbears of the Louisville & Nashville were the Lexington & Ohio railroad and the Louisville, Cincinnati & Charleston railroad. In 1838 the cars ran | rice a day between Lexington and fankfort, and a few years later rail communication was extended to Louisville, the latter city having aranteed bonds of the company to the amount of \$900,000. The Louisville, Cincinnati & Charleston road was incorporated by the legislature of South Carolina, North Carolina, Tennessee and Kentucky, with a capital of \$15, eco.coo. This company bought the old South Carolina road extending from Charleston to Hamburg, Ga., a distance of 136 miles.

Only the Legs of a Fowl Eatable.

When at a "smothered chicken" dinner in New York the other day a guest expressed a preference for legs, an epicure present told this story: "We were touring Europe and had stopped at Lepsino, a short distance from Athens. The landlord of the small hotel served with every meal a large dish containing a sort of stew, the principal ingredient of which was turkey drum sticks. For days we thrived on drumsticks. They were good, but we began to wonder why he never gave us any other portion of the turkey. It was finally left to me to make inquiries, so I approached with some trepidation, not caring to seem officious, the head of the house. When I intimated that he might have saved the breasts, wings, etc., for some special occasion he looked at me and laughed. 'You like them?' he asked. 'It is all yours. In Greece! we eat only the drumsticks.' He then showed me three or four of the fattest young turkeys, weighing from seven to nine pounds, from which only the legs had been removed. 

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION, TO BE SUB-MITTED TO VOTE OF THE PEOPLE ON TUESDAY,

NOVEMBER, 4, 1902.

S. J. R. No. 3. JOINT RESOLUTION.

Amending Article 5, Section 2, of the Constitution of the State of Texas requiring all persons subject to a poll tax to have paid a poll tax and to hold a receipt for same before they offer to vote at any election in this State and fixing the time of payment of said

Be IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article 6 Section 2 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 2. Every male person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this state one year preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which he offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and every male person of foreign birth subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who not less than six menths before any election at which he offers o vote, shall have declared his intention to become a citizen of the United States in accordance with the Federal Naturalization Laws, and shall have resided in this state one year next preceeding such election and the last six months in the county in which he offers to vote, shall also be deemed a qualified elector; and all electors shall vote in the election precinct of their residence; provided, that electors living in unorganized county may vote at any election pre cinct in the county to which such county is attached for judicial purposes, and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said poll tax before he offers to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing his poll tax paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer anthorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election, and tihs provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Sec. 3 The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election.



Mrs. Manderson, of Omaha, is the possessor of an old plate, perhaps the only one of the kind in existence, which confirms the statement that there was an effort made to locate the national capital on George Washington's estate. In her letter to Mrs. Justine V. R. Townsend, regent of the Mount Vernon Association of the Union, Mrs. Manderson says: "I ask the acceptance of a small plate that came to me from an ancestor on the paternal side. Experts believe that it is unique and that all others like it were destroyed. It is of common blue ware, known at the time of its manufacture as semi-china. The face of the plate has a representation of a capitol building very similar to the first capitol erected at Vashington, which was destroyed by the British during the war of 1812. On the back of the plate is the inscription: "Mount Vernon, the seat of government of the United States."


