

We would impress upon the ginners the fact that this agent is a sworn officer of the Government, and that their reports are forwarded as given to him directly to the Census Office, at Washington, without passing through the hands of any middlemen. The informa tlon given is held as strictly confidential, and the operations of individual ginners, are not divulged. Upon the joint cooperation of the cotton growers, ginners and local agents must depend the success of the Census Office in this inquiry, and its ability to render this great service to the Southern people and to all interested in the cotton staple.


