## How the "Staked Plains" Were

That part of the elevation within Texas and New Mexico receiv ed long ago the designation of the "Llano Estacado," or the "Staked Plains." And the origin of the name is thus given by one versed in the lore of the upland: An ancient fued existed between the Pueblo with other mountain tribes and the fierce Comaches of the Plains. Ancestral warfare on the borders of the hunting grounds kept the tribal enmity blazing and hos. tile blood flowing.
So long and so fatal to the Pu legendary prophecy was cherish ed by the medicine men of a deliverance to come about by the advent of the great chief from beyond the Plains. Fach year the mountain tribes would jour ney to the western limit of the plains and thence further out pon the plateau till prudence dictated a pause. There with ictated a pause. There with ceremony, the chief muperstitious eremony. the chief medicine brought from the social fire rought from the temple at home. This act was marked by fervent prayer for the coming of the great chief. This over the tribes returned, setting up stakes along the way to guide their deliverer to their mountain home. These stakes and the
Pueblo trails, were found by the explorers of the "Plains" and hence the name of Staked Piains. -Merkel Mail.
