Friend-In-Need Society. Having studied the Insurance question for years from the standpoint of both old line com. panies and the beneficiary Or ders, we have noticed that in large majority of cases wher death occurs, the families of deceased have but little money in hand and that they are from two to six months realizing o insurance policies.
Again, we find that a great many people are unable to carry even the moderate amount of insurance allowed by the frater nal orders, owing to the small ness of their incomes
This society has grown out of these conditions. It has but one purpose-to place in the hands of the beneficiaries of its deceas ed members, immediately afte death, a sum of money whic will tide them over the hardes time. This sum will be one dol lar for each member in or standing up to five hundred do lars, but in no case will mor than five hundred dollars be paid When the membership passe five hundred, any surplus aris ing from assesants aris main in the tre rer meeting the next loss
neeting the next loss.
Tollars and the fiee is two dollars and the advance assess ment for the beneficiary fund one dollar. So that it costs 83 to become a member. Aside from the membership fee, not
more than one dollar a year can more than one dollar a year can
be collected from each member for expenses.
Reputable white persons. male and female, between the ages of 18 and 55 years, are eligible to momborship, but applicant
must be in apparent good health. Persons desiring to become nembers can apply to a duly uthorized representative, or to the Secretary of the Society dollars, and the advance asess ment of one dollar, for which hey will deeive for which Their name will then bo befo he name wip hen go ber lected, certificates ot member hip are issued; if ojernber ship are issued; if rejecte
money will be refunded. Persons becoming member will have no further payment to nake on death call until death ccurs, when they will be noti ied of an assessment of one ollar, payable in ten days.
Members can make their cer
tificates payable as they wish, ificates payable as they wish This will enable men without amilies to provide for decent burial. In cases of continued ilness, resulting fatally, it will to procure proper nursing and medical attention, as parties who attend them will have knowledge of the fund provided, which the sick member can leave to be paid to them.

"Since snake skin has become so fashionable in wallets, belts and cigarette cases," said a zoo keeper in one of the big Eastern cities recently, "we find rather a dearth of snakes each month, not for exhibition purposes, but as a food, for many of our most valuable spectmens are canibals, and will eat nothing but their own kind. Well, up to a year ago, men visited us regularly with snakes for sale, and we had no difficulty in buying all the 'pines' and 'blacks' and 'garters' we desired at from 5 to $\mathbf{2 0}$ cents a piece, according to size.
