Carnegie the Taxgatherer. At the dedication of the new public library, at Washington, dedicated to the Nation by Mr. Andrew Carnegie, in response to President Roosevelt's re hat during the past ten years he had given 760 libraries and that he now has under considera tion more than 800 applications most of which will be granted. Of all the men of colossal wealth Mr. Carnegie, more than any man of any time, appreciates the selation of his surplus to the public and he is giving it away as rapidly as possible. His doc trine that it is a crime to die rich is a startling way of putting the obligation of wealth.
But Mr. Carnegie in this speech delivered another sententious utterance. He said: "I am in the library manufacturing business and beg to be allowed to concentrate my time upon it until it is finished. This is not charity, this is not philan. thropy, it is the people helping themselves by taxing themelves."
There is the truth in very plain form. Mr Carnegie has been gathering taxes and he is returning them to the people. the form of a high tariff and cor poration favors, he has collected more than a proper fee for his services as a manufacturer. He has not earned his wealth by anything he has done He may anything he has done. He may
be credited with extraordinary be credited with extraordinary
foresight and business ability, foresight and business ability,
and these deserve their reward. But they do not deserve the re ward of so much money that is doubtful whether he can realiy distribute ii judiciously, so meal so, indeed, that it grows faster than he is giving it away.
By his own philosophy he has Maypearl postponed." more than was his just recompense, and now he voluntarity assumes the function of trustee. It is commendable in him to take this view and follow this course. But what of the system of laws which makes persons tax- $\varepsilon$ ather.

Mr. Carnegie is only one of thousands who have thus taken the people's substance. He is the only one who rises to the Elevated plane of conscience The others acknowledge no such obligation, and when they are moved to give anything to the public they pose as philanthropists. They are tax gatherers, as fully authorized by the government as if they had received an express commission, but are under no equirement to burse their collections we have today thousands of million aires and billionaires who acquired wealth by devious methods, some by evasion the aw. others in defance of the w. others in defiance of the involuntary tax gatherings are in the moral philhos, and Mr. Carnegie announces which r. Carnegie announces they nuch to uch to expect that they will all disgorge but it is be to ssgorge, but it is to be hoped truth and renew its to the ruth and renew its efforts to at least put a limitation upon their operations. acquired is to be encouraged, for it is a proper stimulus to effort and development, but the colossal fortures of these latter days are simple lcot under the warrant of law. If all men were as generously disposed as Mr. Carnegie we might afford to let the tax-gathering go on. Even then it would be pruper to inquire whether we ar3 ready to surrender th right to dispose our taxes. We might prefer to put less in libraries and more in coal and clothes for the poor. But all men are not Carnegies, avorites of the law to tax the eople so long will we endurro mpensatiou of any sort and so onge will we eacourage the now vexing the Nation.
