BREAK WITH BOWEN.

Allies Irritated by His Late Note Refuse to Treat with Him Further.

Irritated by the note of Minister Bowen, Venezuela's representative, addressed to the British ambassador on Monday last, refusing to accept the allies' proposal for a scheme of preferential payments by which Great Britian, Germany and Italy were to receive 20 per cent and the remaining creditors 10 per cent of the custom receipts at Lo Guayra and Puerto Cabello, the allies have instructed their representatives at Washington to submit the question of preferential treatment for settlement to President Roosevelt, and in the event he declines to act as arbitrator, to take this and perhaps the entire controversy to The Hague for settlement, thereby breaking off negotiations with Mr. Bowen.

At ten o'clock Friday there was a conference of the representatives of the allies. If it is found that President Roosevelt is not disposed to allow himself to be dragged into the negotiations, the instructions of the allies are such as to permit them to force the embarrassment of a rejection at the hands of Mr. Roosevelt, and instead of making known their wishes to him, steps will be taken to draw up a protocol with Mr. Bowen for a con tinuance of the case at The Hague, as suggested by him in his note of last Monday. The British ambassador was the first to receive instructions to this effect, and the matter was discussed at the conference between the three representatives of the allies.

The allies have declined to negotiate further with Mr. Bowen on the question of preferential treatment on account of the vigorous tone of his recent note rejecting their 20 per cent proposition. They have instructed their representatives to submit the question to President Roose velt, and in the event he declines to pass on it, to refer the whole matter to the Hague.

The tormal signing of the treaty with Colombia for the construction of the Panama canal by the United States has no greater future domestic significance than its certain effect to wonderfully accelerate southern development.

There will be a striking new balance now in population concentration, trade and varied industry. The long overlooked south is said to have her delayed grand inning. She will be the 'new south" indeed.

For almost a generation the south bravely delved in the debris and ashes of the civil war to clear the right-of-way for the golden car of progress hitherto rolling undeviantingly westward. Had there been no war, in all probability, the center of population would be within the souther states. The south had more than the west, genial and seasonable climate, undeveloped natural resources, an abundance of cheap and susceptible of high productivity, great markets at her door, and plenty of room for home-seeking millions. But the south was under a ban. The emigrant tide swept by her to the west, ignorant of the vastly better opportunities to be found nearer home. The west filled up and the south lav fallow for the few who knew the "ground floor" when they were on it.

The opening of the Panama canal to the world's traffic will more directly and largely benefit the cotton belt than any other large section of the country. The vast current of overland traffic will be in large degree di verted to the South Atlantic and gulf seaboard, stimulating southern railroad building proportionately, and building at southern harbors cities that will rival the greatest of the north. The editor in proportion to his means does more for his town than any other man, and in all fairness, man with man, he ought to be supported-not because you happen to like him or admire his writing, but because a local paper is the best investment a community can make. It may not be crowded with great thought, but financially, it is of more benefit than both preacher and teacher. To day editors do more for less pay than any men on earth. Patronize your home paper, not as a charity, but as an investment."






