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

Dalhart, Tex. July 28.—The case of the State of Texas vs Geo. F. Kornegay, for the killing of Judge W. T. Keith at Dalhart on May 21 last, was concluded in the District Court at Claude Saturday night. The jnry was out only & short time when they came in with the verdict of not guilty.

\$16,000,000 in Litigation.

New York, N. Y. July 25 .-One of the most startling accidents in the history of yachting around New York has been recalled by the appellate division, which has handed down a decision settling the long standing litigation over the \$16,000,000 estate of William T. 
