## Terrel Election Law Defended By

 Its Author.A special dated Neb. 5, from Ft. Worth, to the Austin States man $^{-}$gives Judge Terrell's speech before the meeting of the County Judges and Commis sioners' association. The Lead er publishes the follwing extracts from the address
"I assume all responsibility that is proper for the new elec tion law. The poll tax payments have ended; the howl of angry candidates has about ceased; the complaints of the grafter and fers and aspiring fools will con tinue for a time but the hour has come when the honest voter should know the truth about this election law. I am here werfirst those who say that

Now this is the one taw ne only law or the statute book, that provides for its interpreta tion, by instructiou cards, with
out going to lawyer All the kinks and difficulties of the law have veen unraveled by the sec retary of state and attorney general, and what is called 'instruc tion cards' have been sent to every one of you jndges. They day at every voting place in Texas. They instruct the voter regarding all his rights and ducounty judge, precinct judges and clerks what each must do:
they tell the voter what he must he must fold his ballot, had
everything that the voter shoutd ellof the pepalties, sonudrel vir bity s

negroes, to overwhelm the votes of the honest men. This game
was worked in Auatin. San An tonio. Houston, Fort Worth Dallas and elsewhere. How long
could free government last if such rascality continued? One great object of this law was to
prevent tratfic in poll tax ceipts. Of course the legal machinery to do tbis was a little o stop complicated villainy What honest man can complain of this? Who wants the pur chasable voter to pay his poll tax? It was hoped that purchasor yellow would oot pay the poll tax and that the control of the
government would pass to those who from pride of manhood would pay it without percuasion.
If honest judges are at the polls
