That there is confidence in the early return of prosperity to the cattle interests of the country is evidenced by the voluntary action of leading banks in many instances offering to extend cattle paper that they have been

carrying for some time. When the banks have confidence such as this in the situation, it would certainly seem that there is occasion for no one to become seriously alarmed. The general impression among those who are well posted is that the coming spring will mark the beginning of a new era in the cattle business of the entire country.-Texas Stockman Journal.

That the backbone of the strike is broken is a statement not open to dispute, but strike leaders still cling to the hope that union recognition may be made the price of returning to work. Packers, however, are obdurate. They have broken in a new force of butchers and while still badly crippled are in better shape for carrying on the fight than the unions. In striker circles desperation has become acute. Parkers are merely awaiting the rush back to work. When it comes time, killing will be resumed on a normal basis, but if that event is made the signal to rush held-back cattle to market demorilization
