The Tipping Custom.

The enormity of the practice of "tipping" is realized by comparatively few. The masses of the people do not stop to think of the aggregate burden of this vanity imposed tax. The tipping practice has its origin in selfishness. One tips an employee of an institution, believing thereby that special attention and service will be given because of the tips, notwithstanding the one thus tipped is employed and is therefore under obligations, to give all necessary service to all the patrons of the institution. It is not always selfish when one gives tips, but the tyrany of the custom and the circumstances in which one is often placed where others are slavishly yielding to the odious practice, make it quite embarrassing not to "fall in line."
