FORT WORTH MAN WILL SPEAK AT TURKEY GROWERS MEETING

George McCarthy, Fort Worth, vice president of a large feed concern, will be the principal speaker at the annual meeting and barbecue of the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association at the City Park in Eastland on Tuesday night, Oct. 6, it was announced today.

Turkey barbecue and trimmings will be served to the group. The general public as well as turkey growers, feed men, hatcherymen, buyers and processors are invited to attend the function. The tickets are \$1.50 each and may be obtained from any of the officers or directors or from the

County Agent's office in Eastland. Morris Newnam, Ranger, who fed the group at their first annual barbecue last fall, will again have charge of the barbecue and other food. The serving is expected to get underway at 7 o'clock with McCarthy's address and meeting afterwards.

Dr. Ben H. Bradley, Rising Star, president of the turkey growers, will again act as master of ceremonies. Other officers include Ben Wilson, Clyde, vice president; and Mrs. J. H. Tidwell, Desdemona, secretary-treasurer.

The association, organized in early 1952, has for its objectives the promotion of the raising of quality turkeys in the area, dissemination of sound and practical information on management and marketing of the big birds, encourage boys and girls to have turkeys as projects, an annual tour, an annual meeting and barbecue. The group has regular monthly meetings on the third Tuesday of each month.

1953 State Fair To Offer Bigger Museum Displays

Museums at the 1953 State Fair of Texas, Oct. 10-25, will offer a tasty menu of diverting entertainment spiked with enough nutritious dashes of solid information to afford a healthy tonic for anybody's fund of facts.

Admission is free to the Museum of Fine Arts, Museum of Natural History, Hall of State Aquarium and Health Museum.

Homer II, a new Transparent Man, will move into his home in the Health Museum in time to receive visitors at the fair.

The new man will be 5 feet, 11 inches tall and have an outer skin of plexiglass and a skeleton of brushed aluminum. He will "talk" to visitors in his own "voice."

Exhibits on nutrition, polio and geriatrics (care of the aging) will also be featured at the Health Museum.

The Hall of State will feature a Jacksonville housewife and mother, Mrs. Frank B. Burress demonstrating with old-time spinning wheels and looms, the nearly lost art of spinning and weaving. She works with flax and dyes made from native plants, roots, grasses and flowers which she cultivates.

Also in the Hall of State will be the Battle of the Alamo diorama and romantic relics of the Texas pioneers who fought to carve an empire from wilderness.

The Museum of Fine Arts will spotlight the annual State Fair Art Exhibition, a cross-section of work by the best Texas painters and sculptors, plus trends in modern architecture, furniture and interior decoration, the Texas Press Photographers fourth annual show and a "Trip To The Moon," in a portable planetarium.

Brown pelicans and mountain sheep will be the newest additions in the Museum of Natural History, whose collection includes stuffed animals, fossils, minerals and gem stones, bird eggs and butterflies.

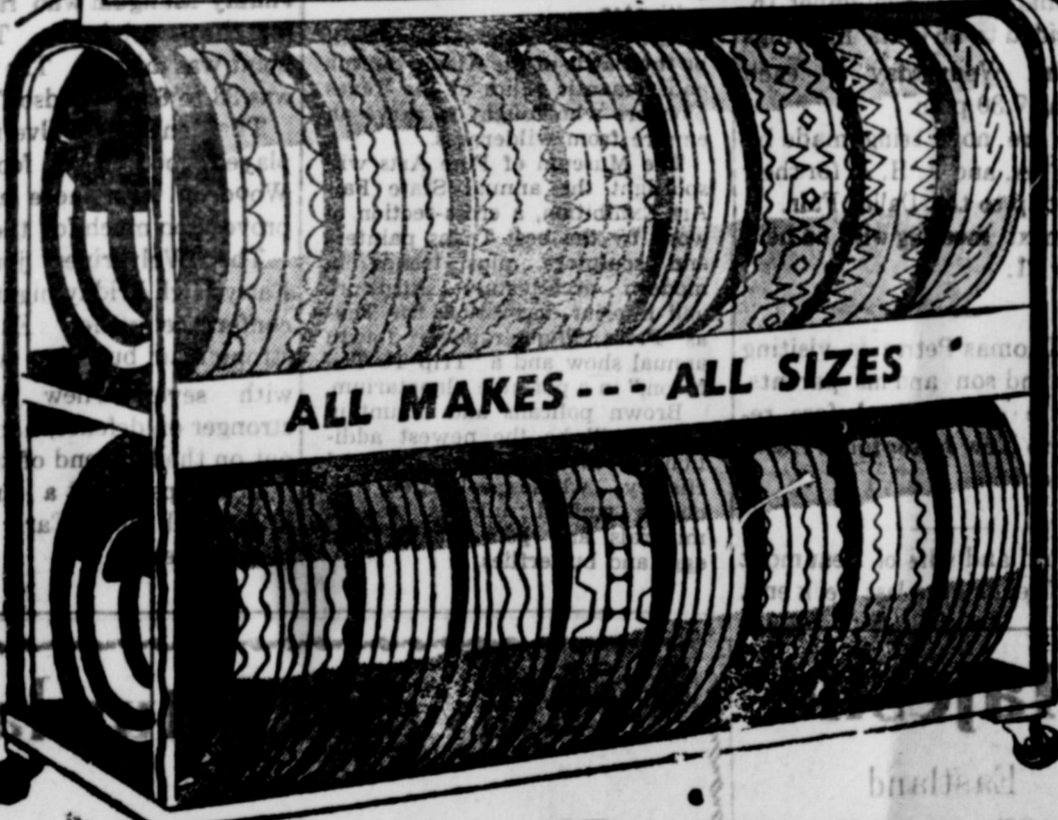

Gorman Man Is Named President Livestock Raisers

Some 400 persons were present Thursday night for the annual barbecue and meeting of the Eastland County Livestock Raisers Association at the City Park in Eastland. A barbecue dinner was served to 360 persons. Boyd Hilley, Gorman shorthorn breeder, was elected president for the coming year, succeeding Sutton P. Crofts of Cisco. Other new officers elected were Vernon Humphries of Eastland, vice president; T. D. Wheat, Eastland, secretary, and C. M. McCain, Eastland, treasurer.

The board of directors was elected as follows: M. S. Long, Eastland; A. V. Clark, Cisco; Clyde Grissom, Eastland; Douglas Fry, Cisco; P. T. Smith, Ranger; Ed Harrison, Gorman; Mark Crow, Eastland; B. S. Dudley, Jr., Ranger; Robert Donovan, Cisco; Morris Newham, Eastland; Dr. J. H. Denton, Cisco; Leslie Hagaman, Ranger; J. M. Cooper, Eastland; Pete Tindall, Eastland; H. C. Wilkinson, Ranger; James Starr, Cisco; Cecil Shultz, Rising Star; Johnnie Aaron, Eastland; H. H. Durham, Eastland; Sutton P. Crofts, Cisco, and R. E. Harrell, Ranger.

A. B. Jolley, retired county agent and Dallas radio and television speaker, was the program speaker. He complimented the association on its program, pointing out that many benefits can be derived through cooperative effort.

He called attention to the fact that much of the milk and poultry products consumed by Texans comes from out-of-state. Mr. Jolley reported that the House Agriculture Committee, which now is touring the nation in the interest of the 1954 farm program, is expected in Texas soon. Mr. Crofts, who headed a large Cisco delegation to the meeting, described the affair as a success from all standpoints.

Milk Producers Report On Sales

Handlers in the Central West Texas marketing area sold 1.82% more Class I milk (fluid milk, skim milk, buttermilk, flavored milk and cream) during August than in July. Byford W. Bain, Market Administrator, announced today. The total daily Class I sales for the area amounted to 262,614 pounds as compared with 257,911 pounds in July and 241,565 pounds in June. The August daily Class I sales were 8.71% greater than in June.

The minimum uniform price received by producers in August was \$3.99 per hundredweight for 8,030,745 pounds of 4.0% milk. This price is the result of 91.6%, an increase of 22 cents over July, or 7,358,296 pounds, of milk from producers sold as Class I at a Class I price of \$6.221 per hundredweight and 8.4%, or 672,449 pounds, classified as Class II at a Class II price of \$3.677 per hundredweight.

There were 560 producers delivering milk to the Central West Texas marketing area in August as compared with 551 in July and 544 in June. The average value of milk per farm was \$859.00, an increase of \$20.58 over July and \$85.65 over June.
