



The press association throughout the country are more and more discussing the methods of making the business more profitable. Higher prices for labor, machinery, buildings, paper and every item that goes into the make up of a paper is forcing this. Many papers have been very liberal in dealing with the public, so much so that the business has not as a whole been regarded as a profitable one. For sometime past the best papers have made it a rule to charge for all notices, the purpose of which is to make money from the notice, but in spite of this they have been worked to a finish in many localaties. Church societies have thought that because they were engaged in a religious work they should have free notices, though they have not stopped to consider that the preacher who leads their services must have his pay, and that the publisher not only has to make his living from his paper but has to pay out money for everything that is connected with the publication of such notices. Cornivals and street fairs, because they are of a semi-public character, have often demanded and sometimes received, free notices from the papers, while every one else connected with them has demanded pay for services. 
