MAN'S BRAIN NOT GROWING

Scientists Assert That Practically There Has Been No Change Since Dawn of History.

While there may be more or less change or variation, men are of practically the same stature and the same size of rain today as they were before the dawn of history. In prehistoric ages the size of the human brain increased enormously. It is now larger relatively to the bulk of body than that of any other mammal, and is proportionately five or six times larger than that of any Simian now existing. In the Simin the elephant and horse, wherever there is much cerebral substance there is a corresponding "educability" or power of storing up individual experience as opposed to instinctive racial experience. But in man the increased bulk of brain ceased in the early palaeolithic times. "Educability" then began to differentiate the human races.
