Mr. E. A. Calvin, former pres-
ident of the Farmers Union, and
at present general manager of
the Farmers Union Cotton Ware-
house Company, has issued an
official notice to the effect that
the company will not loan any
more money on cotton for the
present, and this is taken tomean
that cotton will soon begin to
move. As the market is supplied
it is expected that the 15 cent
mark can be attained.
It is stated that the apparent
stringency in the money market
has been responsible for the act-
ion on the part of the company,
and, while it is claimed that it
dues not necessarily mean that
the farmers will stop the storing
of their product, it is conceded
that the farmers will not feel
disposed to hold their cotton un-
less they can at the same time
procure an advance of a portion
of its value.
