Texas for the year of 1907. This report has been forwarded by

As the benefits to be derive from the regulation of this com mission are now better under caused by their enforcement anitary commission invited th secretary of agricultural, Hon James Wilson, to co-operate in the work of tick eradication, the United States congress having appropriated money to assist vith that department. The in vitation was accepted and a force f about twenty men, divided in three sections, at Colorado City Stamford and Quanah have ma erially assisted this commissio in the work of tick eradication wing to the insufficiency of th state funds we could not employ as many men as we really need. The work has been largely confined to the provisional area he firing line. The work has nd about 500,000 cattle been dipped for the eradicatio of ticks.
