Dear Sir:- Under the caption of "Tax Renditions Remain the Same," in your last issue you un-
dertake to report the proceedings of commissiner's court of Runnels county held on the 16 th, inst.
The matter was so erroneously reported that I have taken the
trouble to investigate the source trouble to investigate the source pleased to learn that you are not
at all to be blamed for the mistake.
It was not "unanimously decided to pay no attention to the full rendation idea." Just to the contrary, the commissioner's y , most heartily favors the full rendition idea as being the only possible plan by which the burden of taxation can be equally
and equitably distributed. But we were and are unanimous on
one proposition, - that the citi-
zens of Runnels county, owing to the serious drouth of last yea and the preset financial situation,
are not in position to, and should not pay more taxes in dollars and paying for 1907. (Individually paying for 1907 . (Individually,
I question whether they should have to pay more, according to what they have, under any circumstances.) And we are afraid of the other fellow-the othe counties. We fear that the people of east and north Texas will talk loud about full renditions, as they did last year, and then put their black lands in for taxation at from ten to fifteen dollars per acre, just as they did last year. Under the new automatic State Tax Board, the Board waits until the total valuations from all the
