LASCA S ON BRITISH SHIPS

England Seriously Concerned Over Shortage of Seamen to Man Merchant Marine.

England has become seriously concerned over the shortage of seamen to man her merchant marine. Lascars have now largely supplanted the native product. During the last 15 years there has been an increase of 17,103 of these East Indian seamen, as against 510 Britishers. Is consequence, the British government issued a notice recently that foreign work that the mail-order people seamen should not be engaged on British ships in European waters unless they have enough knowledge of English to understand orders given in that language. It is stated that it has been no uncommon thing to find a ship's crew composed of eight or nine nationalities with absolutely no language in common, and perhaps a boatswain who only understands English as "interpreter." The return relating to seamen employed in the British mercantile marine shows 30 English and Irish per 10,000, while Scotland supplies 56 and Wales 44.—Harper's Weekly.
