



A farmer near town says he will soon be through pickings over twelve acres that will yield quarter bale per acre first picking which does not make a showing on the crop. The report comes from Coke and Concho counties that the crops in those counties are the best in the history. Taking all these things into consideration, 50,000 bales is a very reasonable estimate for the receipts at Ballinger.

#### BLOWING HOT AND COLD

In a publication recently there appeared two paragraphs that show how unfairly prejudiced usually clear minded writers are when they come to consider a certain class of subjects.

In one of the paragraphs there was a threat to labor with the next Legislature for the passage of a law to punish prohibitionists who gets drunk with a jail sentence of not les than 30 days. The reason given is that prohibitionists vote to compel every other man to keep sober, and therefore should be made to take there own physic. The main objection to the reason is that it is not true to the fact, and none knows it better than its author. Under the Texas law there is no license granted to any one to force sobriety upon another-it is impossible; the sole aim and effort is to close the saloon, knowing well that simultameously therewith the chief drunkard-factory is destroyed.

The other paragraph speaks of young men, boys of well-to-do parents who hang around bar rooms, gambling hells and places of ill-repute, as "not worth killing with a borrowed gun." Is not that most inconsiderate? If any body is to be killed, why not shoot the men, parents included, who vote to legalize these places? The minor law is an unwarranted infringement of personal freedom. Here is a boy not twenty-one, but grown to all intents-old enough to work the road, old enough to fight for his country, old enough to serve on a sheriff's posse, old enough to be trusted in responsible position, yes, old enough to be hanged if he commits a heinous crime. But he is not old enough to be allowed to go into a saloon. Ah! bosh! Neither has the Journal ever been able to see the fairness in the bitter tirades against saloon men so frequently heard and strange to say, oftener from antis than from pros. There business is licensed, therefore respectable. As a rule they are about as good as those who endorse them by patronage and legalize term by votes. If the economy of twentieth century civilization requiries that the boy be kept away from the saloon till he is twenty-one, the good work may be properly be kept up after he is twenty-one, and the saloon be removed from the man, -Belton Reporter.


