silverware and is able to buy it, and buys from these mail order houses, nine times out of ten he
will buy other goods, and this is where the mail order house
gets in its work, and skins the man on the other items.
I vas in the mercantile business three years, and of course the first cost of goods and profit
made on same. Let me tell you of a little instance that came my customers ordered a bill goods from a Chicago house. saw him when he received the package and opened the goods.
He was badly disappointed when He inspected the goods. Hen two shirts in the order that cost him 75 and 85 cents in Chicago and the express to him. He did
not like the shirs and tried to
trade thein to me for shirt of a cents. He also had a pair of slippers that fell short of his
expectation and wanted to trade them to me. That was his first
order from a mail order house, and he said it would be his last, A strange thing about this, and

instead of paying for goods already ate up and worn out, he that never accommodated him, your home merchant right when you do this, and you know. it.
I say pay your home merchant for goods he has sold you on credit. I say take the quaiity of the freight or express, and you will find the home merchant is
