

Our code of criminal procedure fixes the venue for the prosecution of perjury and false swearing at the place and in the county where the oath is made, or where the affidavit is used. Under this provision an application for a liquor dealer's license on swearing, in his application to the comptroller for a permit to apply for a license, that he has not violated the law. since the first day of May, 1900, if he swears falsely, may be prosecuted for perjury in Travis county, as the affidavit will be used in Travis county.
