should be that Brownwood can ship her cream to Ballinger． Ballinger Daily Banner． <br> The Bulletin is very much in earnest about the establishment of a creamery at Brownwood，but if Brownwood remains neigh－ bors next and the rest of the world．－Brownwood Bulletin． <br> OUTRAGE． <br> The procedure of the mob at Cairo，Illinois，during the lynch－ ing and dismemberment of Will James，self－confessed murderer and brute，was not nothing short of an outrage against civilized society．It was a veritable orgy of crime，the details of which are too disgustingly revolting to bear respetition． <br> It has been said，and truly so， that＂two wrongs do not make a right．＂Mob law is perhaps nev－ er absolutely justiflable，although there are times when most of us may be led to so believe．But when mobs carry ，on their vengeance quietly，and preserve at least the semblance of order and justice， their work is certainly open to less criticism than when such revolting procedure is indulged as blackens and horrifies the sto－ ry of this crime．It is sincerely to be hoped that every brute guilty of the crime James was guilty of，meets condign punish－ ment，and that with all possible speed．But to punish such crimes in the manner undertaken and carried out by this mob，is | but adding fuel to the flames that will burn away the barriers be－ tween civilized law and barba－ rian lawlessness． <br> Had this series of horrors oc－ curred in the South，many North－ ern papers would take advantage of the opportunity to fling barbed insults against our citizenry．As it occurred in the North，perhaps， they will have the grace to re－ cognize that all people are creat－ ures of passion，and North，South， East or West，very frequently in－ dulge in actions indefensible from a humanitarian standpoint．Our－ selves，we take the latter view of the matter，and wish to make no capital out of the unfortunate occurrences of any sèction or state． <br> IS IT BUSINESS？ <br> During the present fall season， perhaps，half the local newspapers of Texas have received offers for advertising space from one or more mail－order concerns．These offers have been made in good faith，the catalogue houses believ－ ing such advertising worth the money，and offering to pay regular rates for the space． In nine cases out of ten，the news－ papers have rejected such busi－ ness，and consigned the proposi－ tion to the oblivion of an editor＇s waste basket．In doing this，have the newspaper men used good business judgment？The question is worth considering． <br> If the newspapers carried this advertising，it would be a direct mean of turning much trade from local channels into distant marts． Certainly that would work an in－ jury to the local dealers．But the editor would secure the money for his commodity，and apparently both he and the mail－order people should be satisfied． <br> But you ask，＂What of the local merchant meanwhile，where does he come in？Should not the ed－ | itor consider him？＂And the an－ swer would depend． <br> For in many towns the avera business man sends a large bull： his printing to outside houses． is perhaps a bit＂tony＂，and is fashionable to have ulr stat ery printed in＂Metropolisville，＂ don＇t you know．And agaln， many business men don＇t adver－ tise because everybody knows where they are，and it is of course foolish to waste ink and paper perpetually reminding folks of what they already know．All of which would justify the newspa－ per man in following suit，and getting the money wherever pos－ sible，since＂business is business＂． <br> Of course there are some towns， like Ballinger，where a spirit of loyalty to the home papers is cul－ tivated by the business men，and where the newspaper men laugh the foreign mail－order advertis－ ers out of court．Under such con－ ditions，it would pay both news－ papers and merchants to＂trade at home，＂indulging the live and let live，policy．It might be added that enough money is spent in the average town，yearly，on grafting advertising schemes alone，to double the
