IRRIGATION IN WEST TEXAS.

The more progressive farmers living along the streams of this section are taking out insurance against crop failure by putting in irrigation outfits.

There is never a season so wet in West Texas that an increase of crop cannot be produced by one or more irrigations, and in some of the extremly



dry years a good irrigation outfit will nearly always pay for itself in the extra crop over what would have been gathered from the same land without water-

The illustration shows a modern flume constructed of sheet fron three feet in width and curved to a half circle. This flume is on the farms of J. C. and R. A. Brazil, on the Colorado River in San Saba county. The pumping plant was installed by Hall Machinery Co. of Brownwood and consists of a thirty horsepower Foos Gasoline Engine and a number six volute pump which will deliver 1200 gallons of water per minute at an elevation of 58 feet above the

water level in the river. The plant is an unusually efficient ore and is large enough to water 125 acres at a cost of thirty-five cents for fuel for each threeinch wetting on an acre of land.

Brazil Bros.' engine, pump, pipe, belt and valves cost them a little over \$1400 cash, and in order to reach their farms, they built over a mile of ditch along a mountain side and four flumes aggregating about 1200 feet, making their total installation cost them about \$20.00 per acre to put the pumping plant at



## AUTOS CAUSE PANIC.

Stamford, Texas, Sept. 1 .-The automobiles are panic makers," said Homer D. Wade, whose work as secretary of the commercial club has made Stamford famous. "In my business," continued the noted city builder, as he increased his estimate of the population of Stamford in 1920 from 25,000 to 50,000, "I try to see the good in everything but as a prosperity proposition I shy at an automobile like a young colt at a locomotive. I wouldn't give the forty car loads of plows unloaded at Stamford last year for all the automobiles in Texas, so far as developing the country is concerned. Now let me explain," said the popular secretary as the crowd drew around him in amazement. "According to data gathered by the Texas Commercial Secretaries Association—and by the way, I am one of the organizers of that Association, and if you don't belong I will take your membership now-there are 30,000 automobiles in Texas, repesenting an investment of \$45,000,000, and the life of an automobile is esimated at three years, that makes an annual expense of \$15,000,-000 for automobiles, and that is as certain to make a panic as Stamford real estate is to double its value within the next twelve months. Why, that money would build and equip a railroad from Stamford to Chicago with shops and general offices at Stamford,' said the big city secretary as he picked up the city limits and moved them two miles further out. "The fire losses in Texas amount to only \$4,000,000 per annum, and the automobile losses are four times our fire losses. am not knocking the automobile. 
