OF RUNNELS COUNTY

Mr. Editor:

There are two provisions of the Runnels county Special Road Law which I desire to call the attention of all persons subject to duty on the jublic roads in the county. Many of them are not familiar with these provisions of this law, OF FINAL ACCOUNT and I believe they will appreciate this explanation of same.
