CAP YOUR GRAIN WHEN YOU SHOCK IT.

In conversation with A. H. Van Pelt this week, he suggested that because of the amount of rain that had been falling this spring that in all probability wet weather would prevail during harvest and that in order to keep the grain from sprouting, that when shocked it should also be capped. This is done by placing something like a dozen bundles together. then breaking down two bundles and placing them over the heads of the grain that is shocked to gether, placing them at right an gles across each other. We suggest that you do not have your crop too thick. One good stalk of corn or cotton will produce more than two poor stalks. When your corn is fifteen inches high, the small hairlike roots will almost meet between the rows. You should therefore cultivate as nearly level as possible. If you go deeper than two inches, you will cut thousands of these roots and greatly damage your crop. Use a sweep or a very short toothed harrow that is narrow enough to go well between the rows.
