TEXAS LEGISLATURE CONVENES JULY 31

Proclamation for Special Session of Law Making Body Issued by Governor—Redistricting and Appropriations.

Austin, June 21—Gov. Colquitt today issued a proclamation convening the Texas Legislature in special session on Monday, July 31, beginning at 10 a. m.

Two subjects are to be considered: First, general appropriations for the support of the State government for the two fiscal years beginning Sept. 1, and the redistricting of the Senatorial Representative districts. Congress not having fixed the basis of apportionment for congressional districts, that subject is not included. The governor inserts the usual clause which permits him to submit subjects from time to time.

Under the privilege it has been predicted that he would undoubtedly recommend that the Legislature take action with reference to the social clubs of the State. He objects to them selling liquor on Sunday and without taking out a regular saloonkeeper's license.

The Governor has also intimated that he will ask the Legislature to make some corrections in the revised civil statutes as recently codified and provide for their printing, and also postpone their taking effect beyond Sept. 1, as now provided. It is not desirable to have the civil code become effective before it is printed. But above all the outcome of the prohibition election, July 22, may tend to shape things so as to cause other submissions.

The proclamation convening the special session follows:

Proclamation: Governor's office, State of Texas, Austin, Tex. June 20, 1911—I, O. B. Colquitt, Governor of the State of Texas, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution of the

State, do hereby call a special session of the Thirty-Second Legislature to convene in the city of Austin, beginning at 10 a. m. Monday, July 31, 1911. An emergency has arisen by reason of the fact that the regular session adjourned without making appropriation for the support of the State Government, and for the public service of the fiscal years beginning Sept. 1, 1911, and Sept. 1, 1912, and having failed to pass bills apportioning the State into Senatorial districts and into Representative districts, as required by the Constitution.

"Therefore, an extraordinary session of the Thirty-Second Legislature is hereby called for the date above indicated and for the following purposes to-wit:

"1. To make appropriations for the support of the State Government and for the public service for the fiscal years beginning Sept. 1, 1911, and Sept. 1, 1912.

"2. To apportion the State into Senatorial districts and into Representative districts and to fix the basis of representation therefor.

"3. To consider and act upon such other matters as may be presented by the Governor, pursuant to Sec. 40, Art. III, of the Constitution of Texas.

"In testimony whereof, I hereunto sign my name and affix the seal of State at Austin, this 20th day of June, A. D. 1911.

KILLING AT STAMFORD MYSTERY

Abilene Doctor Shoots Robert S. O'Neil, A Traveling Man.

Stamford, Tex., June 20.—Stamford was thrown into a wild panic by a mysterious killing in a washroom of the Stamford Inn here this morning. Robert S. O'Neil, a traveling man for the St. Louis branch of the National Lead Co. who had just arrived in town over the Texas Central, was followed into the washroom by Dr. J. M. Alexander, of Abilene, who had arrived here in an automobile and who sat quietly in his machine reading a newspaper until O'Neil's arrival.

In the washroom Alexander fired several shots killing O'Neil instantly. Alexander then walked to the manager of the inn, to whom he gave up his pistol. He made bond immediately, appearing calm and laughing and chatting with those about him. The cause of the shooting is unknown.

Dallas, June 20.—O'Neil was a young married man. His wife is now in Milwaukee. O'Neil is reported to have been connected with a prominent Milwaukee family. O'Neil was married here in April to Mrs. Gordon, daughter of Mrs. Mary Braid. Mrs. Braid has since moved away. O'Neil's father is said to be a member of the firm of Boden-O'Neil Wholesale Drug Co., of Milwaukee.

COLORADO CONCHO COMMITTEE MEETS.

Old Soldiers Will Meet at San Angelo Fair in September—Will Attend Mountain Remnants Brigade Reunion in Ballinger in August.

In answer to a call issued by Col. R. C. Tillery, the executive committee of the Colorado-Concho U. C. V. Association convened in Ballinger Friday, June 16th for the purpose of selecting the place and fixing the dates of the annual reunion.

R. C. Tillery, of Concho; John Nasworthy, of San Angelo; J. T. Albright, of Glen Cove; H. D. Pearce, of Robert Lee and Sam Taylor of Ballinger, constituted the committee. They were all present except Mr. Pearce, who is in bad health and could not attend.

The meeting was called to order by the chairman, Col. Tillery, and after considerable discussion, San Angelo was selected as place for holding the reunion, and the dates will be the same as the dates of the San Angelo Fair, which will be some time about the middle of September. Col. Nasworthy was authorized by the committee to fix the dates when he learned on what dates the fair would be held and to notify the association of same.

It was moved and carried and an order passed that the Colorado Concho U. C. V. Association accept Ballinger's invitation to be her guests during the Mountain Remnants Brigade Reunion which will be held here on August 2, 3, and 4, and Sam Taylor, W. H. Weeks, S. D. Williams and R. C. Tillery were appointed as a committee to meet the trains and assist the citizens in receiving the members of the Mountain Remnants' Brigade.

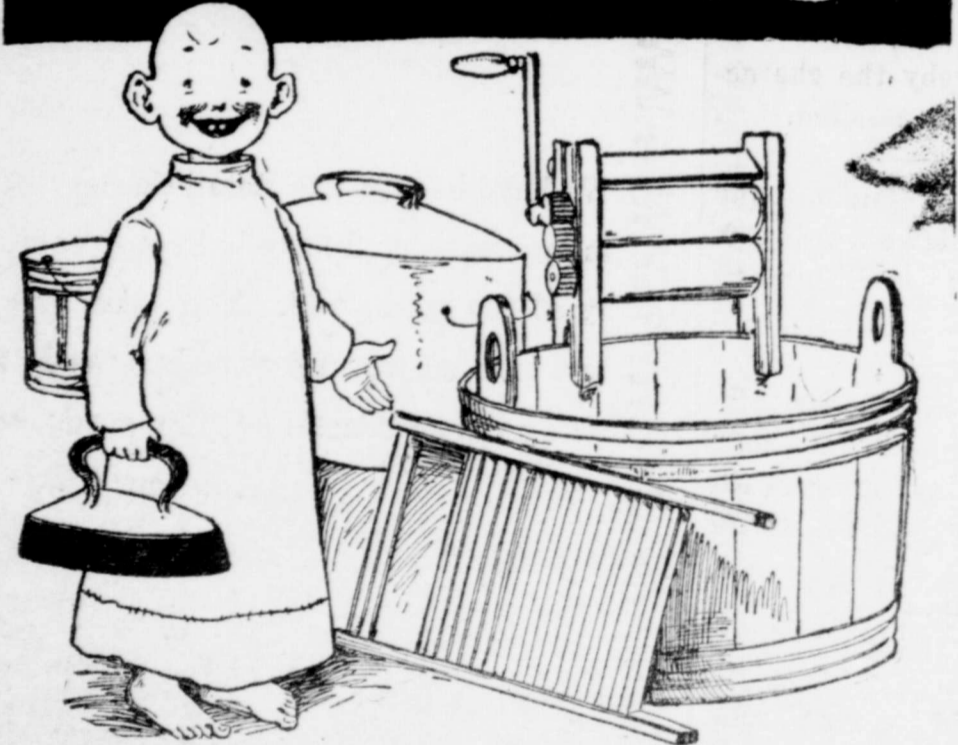

SALE OF LIQUOR TO HUSBAND SUIT BASIS

Fort Worth, June 15—Mrs. Josie Haynes, on behalf of herself and her two sons, Fred 12, and Horace 10, filed suits in the district court for \$25,000 damages against Fred Haberzette, a saloon keeper.

Mrs. Haynes alleges that she first went to Haberzette's August 15, 1910, and pleaded with him not to sell her husband any more whiskey; that drinking was killing him and that he could not resist the temptation to drink.

Mrs. Haynes alleges that Haberzette continued to sell whiskey to her husband, knowing that he was an habitual drunkard. She says that continued to sell Haynes whiskey every Saturday night and that on the morning of January 20, Haynes bought some whiskey that rendered him sick and unconscious for seven days and caused him such agony that it was necessary to tie him in bed.

Setting up that Haberzette's action in selling whiskey to an habitual drunkard was in violation of his license, and that he further violated his license conditions by allowing her two children to come into the saloon, Mrs. Haynes in a separate suit sues Haberzette's bondsmen the Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland for the full amount of his liquor dealer's bond, \$5,000.

BEN KILPATRICK HERE

Once a prominent Citizen of This Section—Became Famous in Montana Robbery Case.

Ben Kilpatrick, the celebrated desperado and train robber, who gained notoriety through the sensational holdup of a train in Montana and afterwards engaged in a running fight with the officers of St. Louis, passed thru Brownwood this morning enroute to Paint Rock where he will face trial on a charge of murder of Olive Thornton of that place. Kilpatrick has completed a ten year's term in the federal prison at Atlanta Ga., on the train robbery case and when he was released last week Sheriff Maddox was in waiting there to bring him to Texas. Ben Kilpatrick was reared in Concho County and began his wild career there just a few years before his Montana experience. He once engaged in a fight with the sheriff of Sutton county, when a brother of his was killed. Ben Kilpatrick seemed to bear a charmed life and although bullets were flying thick and fast he escaped injury. Once a fugitive from justice this Texas cowboy wandered farther and farther north and west, staging some up to date stunts at Denver, in Montana and in St. Louis.

The ten years of service in the federal prison has aged Ben Kilpatrick but a very little. To a local press reporter he said he expects to come clear in the Paint Rock case and that in such event he expected to settle down and live a law-abiding life. He was regretting very much that Sheriff Maddox would not let him have a day's lay over in Birmingham where his wife lives.—Brownwood Bulletin.

Under the new school law teachers holding a second grade certificate cannot be employed to teach high school subjects, therefore trustees should know what they desire to be taught in their schools and what grade of certificate the applicant holds. It would be a good plan for the trustees to have a personal interview with the applicant. Trustees should not employ any one on the condition that he secures a certificate by the time school opens. If possible secure teachers of experience and ability. Bear this in mind, that the success of your school and the future of your children depend largely upon the kind of teacher you have. There are more important things to be taught to your children than the book subjects. Morals, manners, citizenship, justice, health, and the development of character and honor. These depend largely upon the teacher, and therefore you should not permit friendship, sentiment or any other motive influence you in the selection of a teacher, save that of the success of your school and the welfare of your children.

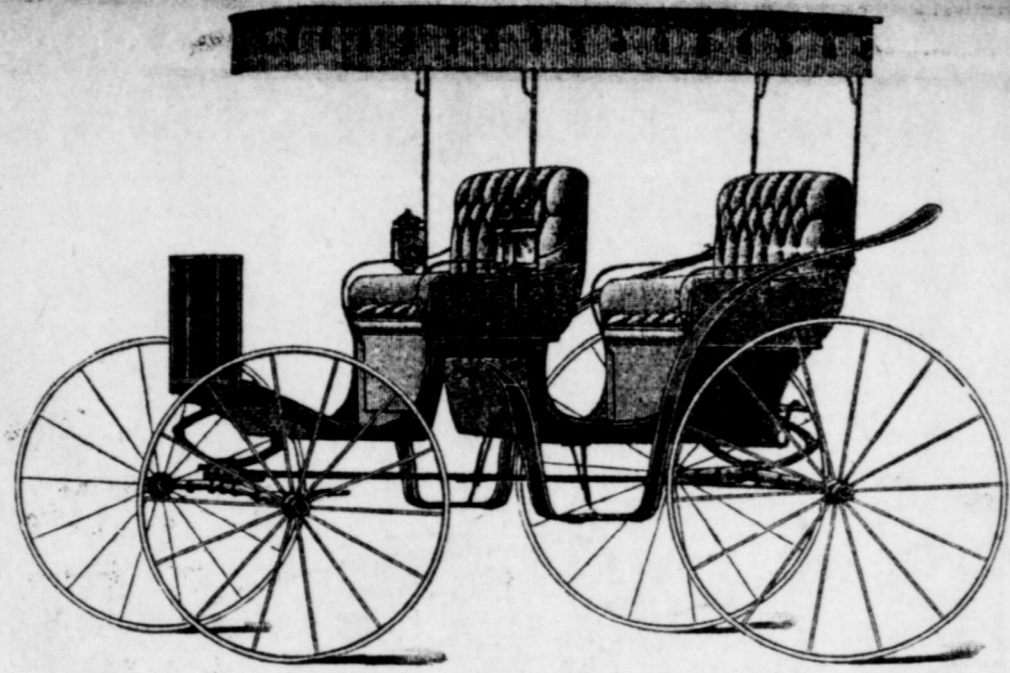

PRO ELECTION JUDGES

MUST BE APPOINTED

Austin, June 15.—The attorney general's department today furnished an opinion to R. E. Bratton, county judge of Tarrant Co., wherein it is held that the regular election judges appointed by the county commissioners for the regular elections cannot serve on the statewide prohibition election to be held next July; that such judges are eligible, but they must be appointed for that special purpose.

It is also held that under the amendment to the Terrel election law passed by the last legislature, the county judge must appoint two judges and two clerks and two supervisors. Under the general election there are four judges and four clerks, but under today's ruling there can only be two judges and two clerks named. This ruling reduces the number of judges by half.
