## EX-OPEN RANGE COW PUNCHERS

By-Laws, Rules and Regulations Governing the Ex-Open Range Cow Punchers Ass'n of Runnels and Adjoining Counties.

1. This organization shall be known as the Ex-Open Range Cow Punchers Association of Central West Texas.

2. It is planned by perfecting this organization, that it shall renew and bring into closer relationship, the acquaintanceship and good fellowship heretofore created and existing amongst the Ex-Open Range Cow Punchers of this and adjoining counties prior to the year 1890, and for the purpose of promoting same, there shall be an annual "Round up" held at such time and at such place as may thereafter from time to time be decided upon, in conjunction with which there is to be a barbecue.

3. Those eligible to membership in the afore named organization are citizens residing in this and adjoining counties, who actually were engaged in the working of cattle on the open range here previous to the year 1890.

4. The officers shall consist of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, which shall be elected annually.

5. Every member in good standing shall have the privilege of inviting a guest and if the guest be at the head of a family, then and in this event, the initiation to him includes his family.

6. Initiation fees shall be \$1.00 and the annual dues shall be 50 cents per annum, payable in advance.

7. Should the membership by a Viva voce vote elect any outside person not entitled to membership in this organization, as per section three of these by laws, then and in this event, he shall be permitted to participate in the benefits of the organization.

8. The surviving wives and daughters of such cow men, if they were still alive, (if such deceased Husbands and Fathers were eligible to membership in this organization as per section three of these by laws) are hereby constituted Honorary Members of this organization and are hereby entitled to participate in all benefits accruing therefrom, without my initiation fees and annual dues required of them.

9. These by laws can be amended and added to from time to time as the exigency of the occasion may require, by a 2 thirds vote of the entire membership.

Resolved First: That in the death of this good brother, the Baptist Church at Hatchel has lost the oldest and one of her most beloved members.

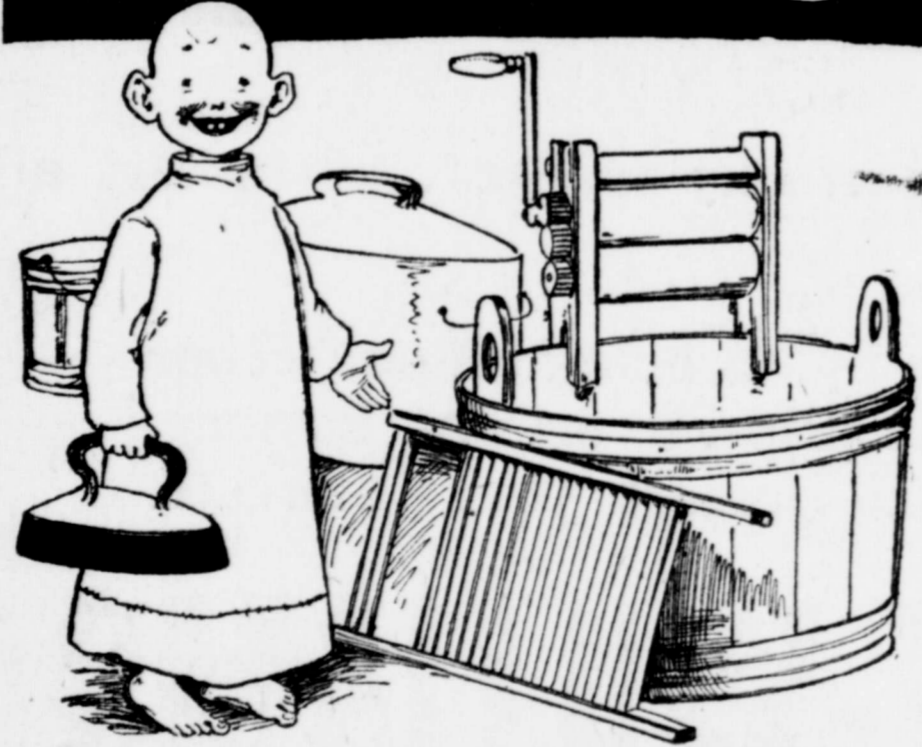
