Austin Sept. 4.-At a called meeting of the state Board of Education to day the board, on data submitted by the Comptroller and the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, declared the per capita apportionment for the scholastic year beginning September 1, 1911, and ending August 31, 1912, to be \$6.80 on the basis of 993,000 chidren of scholastic age, making a total apportionment of \$6,752,400 the largest per capita apportionment of the State available school funds in the history of the State and the largest total apportion- ton at a salary of \$1500 per year ment by \$458,652.

Former Senator Roger Q. Mills Dead.

Corsicana, Texas, Sept. 2.-Former United States Senator from Texas, Rogers Quarles Mills, died here to-day at the advanced age of 79. He was known as one of Texas' most noted statesmen, having gone to congress for the first time in 1872, and having served continuously as congressman until he was elected to the senate in 1892. He resigned this latter position in 1899, Chas. Culberson succeeding him. Senator Mills was a noted Confederate veteran, starting in as Lieutenant Colonel of the 10th Texas Infantry, and afterwards commanding several regiments. He was born in Todd county, Kentucky, and when a young man came to Texas, where he worked as a clerk in drug store and studied at night, was admitted to the bar, and began the practice of law in Corsicana.

The Fire Marshall shall have the power to summon and compel the attendance of witnesses before him to testify in relation to any matter which is by the provisons of this ordinance a subject of inquiry and investigation and may require the production of any book, paper or document deemed. pertinent thereto. The said Fire Marshal is hereby authorized and empowered to administer oaths and affirmations to any persons appearing as witnesses before him, and false swearing in any matter or proceeding, afore said shall be perjury and shall be punished as such. Any witness to produce any book, paper or document touching any matter un der examination, or who is guilty of any contemptuous conduct after being summoned to give testimony in relation to any matter under investigation as aforesaid shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and it shall be the duty of the Fire Marshal to . make complaint against said person or persons so refusing to comply with the summons or order of said Fire Mayor and City Commission or all of the information obtained by Marshal before any justice of the peace, police magistrate, or in any court of record within the city. and upon the filng of such complaint, such cause shall proceed in the same manner as other criminal cases, and upon conviction any such person guilty of a violation of the provision of this ordinance shall be fined a sum not exceeding twenty-five (\$25.00) or imprisoned for not exceeding 1 day Provided, however, that any person so convicted shall have the right of appeal. ment, of stoves, ranges furnaces or other heating appliances of any kind whatsoever, including chimneys, flues and pipes with which the same may be connected, or a dangerous arrangement of lighting devices or systems or a dangerous or unlawful storage of roleum, gasoline, kerosene, dangerous chemical, vegetable products, ashes, combustible, inflammable and refuse materials, or which in his liable to cause or promote fire or create conditions dangerous to the firemen or occupants, he shall order the same to be removed or remedied, and such order shall be forthwith complied with by the owner or occupant of said building or premises: Provided, however, that if the said owner or occupant deems himself aggrieved by such order, he may, within five (5) days, appeal to the Mayor who shall investigate the cause of the complaint and unless by his authority the order is revoked such order shall remain in force and be forthwith complied with by said owner or occupant. Any owner or occupant of buildings who refuses to be sworn, or who or premises failing to comply with refuses to testify, or who disobeys the orders of the authorities above any lawful order of said Fire specified shall be punished by a Marshal, or who fails or refuses fine of not less than ten dollars (\$10.00) or more than fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each day's neglect; such penalty to be sued for in the name of the city, upon the complaint of the Fire Marshal, before any justice of the peace or court of record within the city. with right of appeal, and penalty when recovered shall be paid into the general fund of the
