Ballinger Public Schools Open, Enrollment Smaller Than Was Expected

The City Schools opened last Monday with a fair enrollment and everything is now moving out in good shape. About the busiest man in all Ballinger this week is Prof. Fleming, and he has things now in good working order in the way of classification, arrangement and assignments of work to the various buildings.

Th Schools are being handled this year by 17 teachers besides the Superintendent, making in all 18 teachers, and no room is crowded for, and that is plenty of room to handle the children, and this will be appreciated by the teachers more than anyone else.

Only a brief program marked the opening Monday, and soon the faculty began to get down to business with the result of an early classification. Following is the enrollment: South Ward Building, 50 pupils, two teachers; West Ward Building, 50 pupils, two teachers; Central Building, 290 pupils, 8 teachers; High School Building, 145, with 5 teachers; making a total enrollment of 535 in all.

Daniels listened to the story but shortly afterward informed Brown that he was under arrest.

Iron Cudgel Found.

Other officers arrived and a thorough examination of the premises was instituted. The iron cudgel with which the murder had been committed was found in a flower bed near the steps of the porch. The shape and dimensions of the iron rod were well adapted for the murderous purpose for which it was

employed. The rod was heavy and had two large taps at one end, making it an ideal weapon with which to deal death blow. The rough end of this rod was smeared with blood.

Trousers Are Found.

Brown told the officers that his trousers had contained four silver dollars and a pocket knife. The trousers were found some distance from the house and in a northwesterly direction. The money was missing from the pockets, and the knife was found some yards, and began their use. They acted further out from the trousers. No like magic, soon relieving my trace of the four dollars was found. EXPLANATION OF THE TABLE

A 16-candle-power lamp costs two-thirds of a cent an hour to burn. If you burn one 16-candle-power lamp from dusk till 10 o'clock every night throughout the year, it will burn 38 hours in June and 204 hours in December. At two-thirds of a cent an hour per lamp, you would use 251-3 cents worth in June and \$1.36 worth in December. You are getting the same amount of light in each case, but in the winter you have to use electric light more hours. If you keep a store and close up every night at 6 o'clock, in the suumer you will need no light whatever; but in December there are 80 dark hours from dusk till 6 o'clock, and it will cost you 53 1-3 cents per lamp for the 80 hours. Whenever you think your Electric Light bills are too high, we want you to tell us about it----But kindly take the above into consideration in contrasting your winter and summer bills.
