## JUDGE W. F. RAMSEY TO TEXAS DEMOCRATS

Believes Platform Pledges Are Binding in Honor.

Believes Pro Matter Should Be Again Submitted to the People---Opposes Recall of Judges.

To the Democrats of Texas: On the 19th of September I issued s brief notice to the effect. in substance, that I would submit my name to the Democratic primaries in July of next year for the normation for the office of Gov-ernor, and that I would, in a short time, make a statement of my views in reference, to some of the more important issues and question now in the public mind. Conformably to the notice then given, I now issue this statement. will be seen it covers and includes only some of the more important matters as to which the public have a right to know my opinion. Other matters will be discussed, and those included herein, elaborated in such speeches as I may have occasion to make during the campaign. Always a Democrat; Loyal to Party

Platform. I am now, as I have always been, a Democrat, proud of the traditions and committed to the principles of the party, I believe that one chosen to public office holds his position in trust for the public good, and that his best service is due to the whole people, whom he is elected to serve. If elected, I shall undertake to be the Governor of all the people of Texas, and, in my official capacity, shall know no class. I am committed to the doctrine that public office is a public trust for the public good, and I believe that the platform made by the party whose mandate I hope to receive, and on which I trust I will be elected, should and will constitute me its trustee, and that such platform shall be to me an anchor, a guide and a chart, and I now promise and give assurance that I will adhere to the principles and policies which shall receive the sanction and ndorsement of the party in the coming lection

### Limitation and Publicity of Campaign Expenses.

I am unalterably opposed to the use of money in all elections and in all primaries, except for such expenses as are absolutely necessary, such as the purchase of stamps, printing and distribution of literature, necessary clerk hire, and the defraying of actual traveling expenses of speakers, when necessary and requested. I am opposed to the employment and payment of speakers in any kind of a campaign, either of any candidate for office, or for or against any issue to be voted upon by the people, and I am opposed to the payment of any npensation to any person for any kind of political service, except that of a purely clerical character, necessary to do the work incident to the distribution



protection and advancement of labor, which I shall seek to have enacted into law, the following might be mentioned: I favor an adequate and effective employers' liability compensation Act. at applied to hazardous occupations, which will guarantee the workingman fair compensation for injuries received in the service of his employer. This law, if passed, will save to railroads and other corporations employing labor the expenses of costly litigation, and will, in the event of injury, give to the work-ingman, or in the event of death, to his family, compensation reasonably commensurate with the loss, without imposing the necessity of a long drawn

out suit and years of waiting. I also favor an effective law creating Board of Arbitration and Conciliation to assist in the adjustment and settle-ment of all labor disputes. I favor an eight hour law as applied to all persons employed in the construction of public buildings, works and improvements. I also favor effective laws in respect

to child labor. I believe that fairly understood there is no conflict between labor and capital,

but, in the broadest sense, their true best interests are identical. But provision should be made for those whose necessities may subject them to impos-Ition and hardship without injustice or wrong to the employer. Reforms in Judiclal Practice and

Procedure.

The practice in the courts of this State is obsolete, incongruous, expensive and out of date. If elected Governor, I will use my best endeavors to secure such changes and modifications as will insure justice, promote dispatch of business and save untold expense. I can not in this statement outline such changes and reforms in detail as I favor, but I will undertake to do so in some detail at an-other time. I believe that I can render some aid in this work by co-operating in a spirit of mutual helpfulness with the Legislature. Such a work well done will better insure justice, the dispatch of business of the courts, the enforcement of the law at such a saving, both in time and expense, as will confer immeasurable benefits upon our people. And in this connection, I trust that I may be pardoned if I venture the opinion that my acquaintance with the bar of this State, my long experience and practice as a lawyer, as well as my service on both the courts of last resort in this State, having jurisdiction of both civil and criminal cases, should enable me to co-operate with any Legislature which is in earnest to render public service, in such manner as to be of benefit to my country, and in so doing I shall have in special memory, not so much the law-yer and the judge, but the too often forgotten man, the litigant and the pub-lic, which has suffered long.

## State-wide Prihibition.

I advocated and voted for Prohibition in 1887, and voted for it in the election held last July, and would vote for such

security that freemen desire." Eing in full accord with this dectrine, I favor a wise, conservative and liberal poli in dealing with the University of Texas, the Agricultural and Mechanical College, the College of Industrial Arts, and the State Normal Schools, and I know that the growth, development and proper ad-ministration of these institutions of learning are essential to the present and fu-ture welfare of the people. The administration of our State educa-

tional institutions, and even our elee-mosynary institutions, should be as completely divorced as possible from the domain of partisan and factional politics. These institutions were established for

the public good, and are maintained at public expense, and should, therefore, be administered solely in the interest of the public welfare, and should not, under any circumstances, be prostituted to political ambitions or used as political assets.

As a step in the right direction, I favor the adoption by the people in the next general election, in November, 1912, of the proposed amendment to the State Constitution, providing that the members of the Board of Regents of the State University and the Boards of Trustees and Managers of the educational, eleemosynary and penal institutions shall be elected or appointed for a term of six years, one-third of the members of said boards to be chosen every two years in the manner that may be provided by law

A statutory special tax for these institutions would assure their greater efficlency, and relieve them from the domination or caprice of either a Legislature, distracted by other demands on their time and attention or by bitter quarrels, or an unfriendly Governor.

The common public schools, upon which the masses of the people must in large measure, rely for the education of their children, should be strengthened and improved in every proper way, and I shall, therefore, take pleasure and pride in using whatever power may be vested in me as Governor, to the end that the public schools throughout the State shall be maintained for a term of not less than six months during each year, and even longer wherever practicable; that faithful and capable teachers shall be adequately remunerated; that efficient county supervision shall be provided for the country schools wherever such supervision has not already been provided; that country high schools shall be established wherever conditions favor their establishment, and that the present high standard in the schools of the State shall be continued and made even better wherever it can be done. I shall, too, if possible, without an increased burden on the taxpayers, as I believe it to be, secure some further extension of the age limit in our public schools.

Encouragement of Agriculture.



I favor a kind and firm treatment of the convicts committed to the Penitentiary; the confinement of such of them, giving preference to white men held for long terms, as can be profitably employed within the walls at such industries as will least compete with free labor; the continuance of the Penitentiary at Rusk, and the operation and enlargement of suitable industries, both at Rusk and Hunisville, and the utilization of the remainder on cane farms at State ac-count, except those whose age, wounds or other infirmities make their employment more desirable and humane in other pursuits in more elevated and healthful portions of the State. Having visited, personally, almost every camp and con-vict farm in the State, with a service of almost a year on the Board of Pen-Itentiary Commissioners, I have some knowledge, acquired at first hand, of the

Penitentiary system. Just Treatment of Capital. I believe in encouraging capital by just and wise laws. I shall rejoice as other lines of railway, standard, inter-urban and street car lines, are built in this State in subordination to the laws of this State, and which are content to obey such laws. 

The most effective way, and the only way, to accom plish this is to prohibit every man from receiving compensation for any kind of political services in any and elections and in any and all campaigns, except as here-inbefore stated. The political hired cam-paigner, the secret attorney and agent, the traveling organizer, the district, coun ty or precinct chairman, and the ward heeler, are no more entitled to pay, and their payment can no more be justified, than to pay the individual voter his per diem for going to the polls to vote.

The extension, the purity and the pres-ervation of our primary election system depend upon the prohibition by law of the improper and lavish use of money in all elections and in all campaigns. Conditions must be made such in this State that any honest man, though poor, can run and be elected to office in Texas, without being compelled or seduced into calling upon and accepting from special interests, contributions to his campaign fund. I am, therefore, opposed to the saloon and liquor interests of this State, or elsewhere, and all other special interests, separately or in combination, influencing or being permitted to influence and control, the politics and public affairs of this State.

Recent events must have convinced the thoughtful citizen that, if our free in stitutions are to endure, strict and vigrous legislation must be enacted, prohibiting and preventing the debauchery of the electorate. 




