It was a clear, decisive, sweeping victory for Wilson and democracy, an unequivocal, clear demand for reform in governmental methods, a renunciation of past campaign methods and an expressed desire of the people to free themselves from trust domination. The meaning of the people could have not of been misunderstood with the popular vote given by them for Wilson and Marshal. To drive the matter home so that no possible misconstruction could be placed on what was meant by the landside, a number of states heretofore doubtful have elected Democratic member of congress and will replace Republican senators with Democrats.

Only three states, so far as known have struck stubbornly to Taft, those three being Vermont, Wyoming and Utah. He may have others when the returnes are definitely known, but if so it will be by such a close vote that there will be nothing complimentary in the vote, and compliments are all that Taft is now expecting from the voters of this country.

Roosevelt did a little better, for he swung the 29 votes of Illiinois into his column, following it with Penn-R sylvania's 23 votes, Michigan with 15 votes, and possibly Kansas with thirteen votes.

The rest appers to belong to Wilson unless itis California, Pennsylvania and a few small states of the west, u which Roosevelt may possibly get on the final count. v Even in Kansas, so long concededly Republican, Rosevelt V was leading this morning in the count by only a few hur. dred, and he may possibly lose that state.

As the news of Wilson's winnings came in over the wires it almost came monotonous filing the states in the Wilson column: Alabama, Arizona, Arkansaw, Colo-Ke rado, Connecticut, Deleware, Florida, Georgia, Indiana, Iowa, Kentuckey, Louisanna, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Montana. Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Ohio, Oklahoma, -but what is the use to recite the whole list of the states? Way down at the tail end Taft did get Wyoming. Wilson will have a majority in excess of three hundred in the electoral college and it may reach four hundred. Think of that with only 531 votes from all states, and only 266 votes required to elect.





ber of "trusties" were at dinner at what looked like a meak good and wholesome enough for any laborer. These men, when told about the complaint, said: "Them niggers would fuss about anything. They have been laying for you-all a week with that soggy bread and raw meat." The commissioners, however, said they would investigate the complaint at once. Of course, some of them do not get the delicacies they once had in their homes and some fare much better.

At every camp visited the pris oners said they received good medical attention and nearly every prisoner who was asked about this at once praised the prison, or camp physician. The consumptive farms two miles from Huntsville, where all of the prison consumptives are gathered, is almost a model hospital equipped with separate beds, porcelain bath tubs, convenient sanitary closets, and excellent ventilation. Each of the prisons and camps have a hospital, most of them being excellently provid ed with hospital equipments.

The female prisoners are kept on separate farm; from the male prisoners, as required by law, the negro and white women in separate buildings. These places are in charge of a matron who takes a kindly interest in them Here, as at the other places, there is every indication that the comfort of the prisoners, their health, and their moral and religious welfare are guarded the best that could be expected of the state. I do not intend to convey the impression that conditions are everywhere ideal but tiey are as good os they could reasonably be expected to be brought about in the short time -less than two years-that the new law with its system, has beeu in operation.

On this same farm the men were told recently that if they picked a certain amount of cotton by Friday night they might have a holiday on Saturday, the amount really being a fair week work. They worked out their "task" promptly on tine. A neighboring farmer wauted his cotton picked and offered a fair price for it. On Friday night the manager went to the farm prison and told the men they had earned their holiday, and that he would give them their choice of resting or picking the neighbors cotton, the money to employees, backed by men chatting together, seeking be given to them. 

The first prize in this class is \$1,000, secor, \$750, third \$500, fourth \$250, and twenty-five of \$100 each.

In class B \$1,500 are offered to the boys and girls of the state who make the best yields from one acre of corn. The prize money is divided as follows: \$250 to the first, \$125 to the second, \$75 to the third, 850 to the fourth and \$25 each to the next forty winning contestants. \$1,500 will also be awarded to the boys and girls in class C, who produce the largest yields of cotton on one acre, and the prizes are the same as those offered for corn.

Twelve prizes aggregating \$1,000 are offered in class D for the best yields of kaffir corn or mile maize grown on two acres without irrigat: and similar awards will be made in class E for the same crops to be grown by irrigation.

There are altogeher 143 pirzes and thoise have been competed for by more than four thousand contestants from 205 counties in the state. The prize winning contestants will have an exhibit of sample of their crops. All the railroads of the state will grant reduced rour trip rates to Dallas on account of t convention, and a very large attendance is expected.



WELFARE COMMISSION RECCOM-MENDS WORKMAN'S COM-PENSATION LAW.

Dallas, Texas, November 5.-The report of Tom Finty, Jr., Chairman of the Committe on Compensation next Legislature. Mr. Finty is a close and able student of economies a gifted writer of national reput. tion, and as staff correspondent of the Dallas News he has illuminated nany important subjects of state.

Mr. Finley's report condemns the present method of fixing responsibility for work accidents as working a hardship to both employ r and employe, and he very clearlays down a much more modern and humane doctrine in the followng language:

'It is economically and socially unsound to require workmen to assume the risks and to hold em> ployers responsible only in the case of their own proven negligence, for the nature of modern accidents are inevitable; that the seeming negligence of employers ofttimes is not negligence at all; and that as accidents are incidental to the industries, the industries themselves, and not the employes, should bear the ourdens resulting there from. In the end society must bear the burder of compensation for work asbasket went over to that home with cidents, and such compensation rea ly ought to be reduced to a definite system and considered in the ight off a pension, just as the government pensions its disabled soldiers.'

The Commission reccommends t the 33rd Legislature the enoctment of a comprehensive workmen's compensation law, modeled after successful legislation of other state and counties, fully set forth in the text of the report.

This is the fifth of a series of articles on the Texas Penitentiaries and prison farms, the law governing same treatment of prisoners, business management of he system, saggested improvements, etc.

The Rusk penitentiary was located by commissioners appointed by Governor Coke in 1875 under an act to locate a branch penitentiary to manufacture iron. The first furnace, the Alcalde, was erected in 1883. This was replaced by the prseent blast furnace, the Sam Lanham, in 1904, which has a capacity of eighty or ninety tons per day. The iron pipe plant was built during Gov.
