## The Southern Methodist Mustangs solled into Saturday's

 game with one thing on their minds - winning. And infirst half, it looked like they had a good shot at it In the first 17 minutes of the game, SMU scored three times leaving Red Raider fans fearful of a disappointing By halftime, the Texas Tech defense had allowed SMU 10 score 22 points and gain 138 yards, only 24 of which were on the ground.
The second half was a different story.
It didn't take the Tech defense long to let the Mustangs know it meant business after coming out of the locker room after halftime.
SMU's first possession went 77 yards on 12 plays and
lasted $4: 46$. This wastheir longest drive of the second half. The result was a 27 -yard field goal from Mustang kicker Russell Anderson. These three points would prove to be
