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U.N approves aid effort to Somalians

UNITED NATIONS (AP) -The Security Council launched the world's biggest armed humanitarian rescue Thursday night, ordering a U.S.-led force to silence the guns of Somali bandits and help feed hundreds of thousands of starving people.

The council voted unanimously to approve the huge operation.

After planning with his generals and working the phones to drum up troop donations from abroad, President Bush was poised to unleash the largest U.S. military operation since the Gulf

Given the order, 1,800 troops aboard a three-ship strike force floating in the Indian Ocean could land on Somali beaches within hours and the full force of 28,000 could arrive within weeks.

France will add as many as 2,000 troops. Italy offered unspecified help.



Health care industry offers universal plan

NEW YORK (AP) - The insurance industry took a big step toward shaping health-care reform Thursday by proposing a sweeping plan for universal coverage that would be financed partly by taxing Americans with generous benefits.

The Health Insurance Association of America said the draft proposal approved by its board will "jump-start health-care re-

A cornerstone of the plan is to cut costs and provide a package of "essential" benefits to all Americans. Those are goals championed by President-elect Clinton.



Legislators come up empty-handed

AUSTIN (AP) — The Texas Legislature adjourned Thursday without producing a school finance plan in a special session marked by partisan wrangling.

"It's a disappointment for the schools and the schoolchildren of this state," said Democratic Gov. Ann Richards. "We have seen very cynical partisan politics played."

Rep. Tom Craddick of Midland, head of the House GOP caucus, said the session was "more political on the other side."

"From a political aspect, she (Richards) is the one that's played the school issue like a yo-yo. And I think there's been a real void in her leadership," Craddick said.

Richards defended her role. "I think I did everything I could do," she said.

The end came when House Republicans, with few exceptions, remained united against a proposed constitutional amendment backed by Democratics.



Tell Mike, I'll be there

The Texas Tech volleyball team faces Louisiana State early in the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship for the third consecutive year.

But, there's a twist on this year's match. The Red Raiders are facing the Tigers in the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum. Tech fell to LSU in the second round of the tournament in Austin in 1990 and in Baton Rouge in

This means that you, the Tech fans, need to get out and support the volleyball team in its bid for glory. For those who aren't aware, Tech's volleyball team is among the top 20 teams in the nation and has a record of 23-9 this season. Tech also beat the University of Texas Lady Longhorns for the first time in 32 tries this year.

This event not only is exciting for the team, it also is exciting for this campus. The Tech Athletic Department gave the NCAA Organizing Committee a strong enough bid to put the match in the Coliseum.

Now, it's time for Tech to show the rest of the nation that we care about Texas Tech athletics. These events are few and far between, and the women's volleyball team is one of the best in the nation.

"That surprised all of us at getting the home match," volleyball coach Mike Jones said Monday in a weekly press conference. "We need to get the people out here in Lubbock back in. I would like to see a crowd of 3,000 or 4,000 people there."

Student tickets cost \$4. And Saturday's match will be the best \$4 anyone can spent for a couple of hours of excitement. Be there at 7 p.m. A capacity crowd will not only impress Tech in the NCAA's collective mind, but also could be the final ingredient needed to propel the Raiders past LSU.

Last season, the Raiders opened the tournament by hosting the University of Georgia. This was the second year the Raiders were in the tourney, but the first year to host a match. The match drew a larger crowd than any other first round match in the South Region.

Let's beat the crowd that was in the Coliseum last year. One of the reasons Tech hosted a second-round match in the women's basketball tournament was because the fans came out to see the Lady Raiders.

This match is important for the team because they hope to return to the sweet 16 of the tourney for the third year.

"It seems to make a difference whether you are at home or not. It seems

like a bigger difference than in the past," Jones said. He is right. Let's make a difference and push the Raiders to victory.

Unwarranted complaints

If criticism toward Ann Richards concerning the recent filming of a Bob Hope Christmas special is the best the Republicans can come up with, then the governor must be doing a great job.

Earlier this week, the GOP accused Gov. Richards of using state funds to promote her 1994 campaign. The \$150,000 in question was applied to assist in the production of Bob Hope's Christmas special, filmed in and around San Antonio.

Whether it was justifiable to spend that much for a TV program is questionable, but assisting in the filming and production of television shows and movies is good for Texas' economy. One movie can pump millions of dollars into a local economy. The filming of this particular TV special helps promote tourism, as it uses filming sites like the Alamo, Riverwalk, Sea World and Fiesta Texas to showcase San Antonio for the rest of the nation to see. Hope can make all the lewd jokes directed at young girls that he wants, but if the Riverwalk is in the background, Texas tourism can't lose.

Gov. Richards will make an appearance on the show, but it is highly doubtful that it would be more than a few minutes. Certainly she cannot be hurt by the national exposure from such an appearance, but would anybody actually vote for her two years from now, simply because they saw her on a Bob Hope special?

The GOP's attempt to use this non-issue as a means to discredit the governor is little more than a pathetic grasping at straws. If they can't find a real scandal to discredit Richards, they must figure that they can make one up.

Since entering the Governor's Mansion, Richards has enjoyed high marks in the popularity polls. It is understandable to hate seeing the opposition doing well, but this is no cause to make mountains out of molehills.

If the Republicans can find something legitimately rotten to pin on the governor, more power to them. Otherwise, they should pipe down. The

public has heard enough partisan bickering this year.

finals and get a head start on their studying by taking care of themselves, Tech Counseling Center Director Rolf Gordhamer said. He suggests eating three balanced

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

Most men buy in large quantities, and the purveyors of marital bliss suggest that volume is the key to finding a

> For most male clients, that's as far as flirtation goes, long-distance love being an excellent way to avoid the quotidian pitfalls of closerrange relationships.

Those who remain serious about their pursuit of love through letters usually plan a trip to the country of their correspondent(s), where they meet one or more women to see if on-site chemistry develops.

Some mail-order professionals offer trips to Russia, where men usually meet a dozen or so women at a time at parties arranged especially for them. At some gatherings, one man can even meet as many as 100 women, and take his pick.

But the laws of supply and demand have also created a market for women who hope to find a mate in a magazine.

About five years ago, a woman who ran a day car center in Anchorage noticed a surplus of single dads who picked up their children every day. So Susie Carter founded a catalogue now known as "Alaska Men USA," which was the first to feature mail-order husbands.

There are several others now, including the slightly less wholesome, Florida-based "Bachelor Book."

Cathi Brinker, the managing editor of Alaska Men USA, said most of the men featured are local guys, who far outnumber women there. And many of their roughly 35,000 women clients, who pay \$24.95 a year to subscribe to the catalogue, say that they, too, are searching for more traditional marriage partners.

Track star Reynolds files charges against IAAF

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Butch Reynolds said Thursday he feels his reputation has been cleared after a federal judge awarded him \$27.3 million from his two-year legal battle with track's ruling body.

Reynolds was banned for two years by the International Amateur Athletic Federation after a meet in Monte Carlo in August, 1990. He fought the case brough the court system, getting a Supreme Court ruling in June which allowed him to run in the U.S. Olympic trials in New Orleans. He finished fifth and did not qualify for the Olympics. Because he ran in the trials, the IAAF extended the suspension four months through Dec. 31, 1992.

Reynolds returned to the courts again and filed suit in Columbus, where he ran his college track for Ohio State and where he now lives. U.S. District Court Judge Joseph Kinneary found that Reynolds lost \$6.8 million in potential earnings during the more than two years he has been suspended by the IAAF.

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




