Lady Raiders down Ohio State for first NCAA Championship

Swoopes sets scoring record for title contest with 47

ATLANTA — With Sheryl Swoopes pounding out 47 points, Texas Tech held off Ohio State 84-82 in the last minute and a half of the National Championship game in Atlanta to accomplish a mission — a victory for the national title.

From the beginning of the season, the Lady Raiders had said time after time that they were on "a mission," and after receiving the Championship Trophy and rings to match, Tech senior Krista Kirkland said their task was complete.

"Mission accomplished," Kirkland said after the game. "I wouldn't want to end it any other way."

Tech ended the season with a 31-3 record and finished with an 18-game winning streak that dates back to the loss to Texas in Lubbock on Jan. 20.

Texas Tech started the ballgame with a two-point lead with a layup by Cynthia Clinger but the Buckeyes, after winning an overtime decision over Iowa the previous day, showed no signs of being too tired to play.

The two-point lead diminished to a one-point deficit with the Lady Raiders playing lead tag with Ohio State for the remainder of the game.

After retaining the lead at the 14:10 mark of the first half, Tech fell behind after Nikki Keyton made a jumper from 19 feet to give the Buckeyes an 8-7 lead.

The biggest lead the Buckeyes were able to muster in the first half was four points before Kirkland hit a 3-pointer from the top of the key to give the Lady Raiders the advantage, a lead Tech would hold until midway through the second half.

Tech went to the locker room at the half owning a 40-31 lead.

"I had my doubts, I'll be honest with you, I had my doubts going into the half," assistant coach Roger Reding said after the game. "But when Coach Sharp told me we have never lost a game when we led at the half, I felt better."

Lady Raider Cynthia Clinger increased the lead to 11 points in the first few minutes of the second half but Ohio State slowly chipped away until the Buckeyes pulled ahead by one point with 10:53 left in the game.

The lead changed hands six times in a little more than a two-minute span but when Tech capitalized on a Kirkland steal after Stephanie Scott was good for a layup, the Lady Raiders held the lead for the remainder of the game.

"It always feels great to be the president of Texas

Tech," Tech president Robert Lawless said from the court of The Omni in Atlanta.

"But this (the victory) is just the icing on the cake. I think it proves what I've been saying for four years — that we truly have the finest women's basketball coach in the country."

Sharp, who was victorious in her first-ever Final Four, followed the team in cutting down the last piece of the net on the basketball goal with tears in her eyes. "I don't know if I can tell you how I am feeling right now," Sharp said in a post-game press conference.

"Obviously it's the greatest feeling any of us have had in our careers. I thought we met every challenge put in front of us, but maybe (the team's) biggest factor was their composure when things weren't going well."

Tech finished the game shooting 54.7 percent from the field and 82.6 from the line.

Kirkland and Swoopes played 40 minutes but Clinger played only 19 minutes due to foul trouble, fouling out with 3:46 left in the game.

End of an era Seniors cap careers with title

ATLANTA — When the buzzer sounded and cheers and tears were flying, the crowd roared and the Court Jesters blared "The Matador Song" after Texas Tech defeated Ohio State 84-82 at The Omni in Atlanta to claim the first national title in the history of Tech sports.

But as the fans were cheering and the realization was sinking in, the Sheryl Swoopes-Krista Kirkland-Cynthia Clinger era came to an end.

But these seniors earned the right to say one thing at the end of their college careers that few seniors are able to say — "We're No. 1!"

Kirkland basked in the glory of the National Championship but realized what the effects may mean.

"We're trying not to get sad because it was our last game," Kirkland said in the locker room after the game. "But this was great. I wouldn't want it to end any other way. It's incredible. What a way to go out."

Noel Johnson said the seniors got what they deserved. "It's sad," she said.

"But I wouldn't want them to go out any other way. This is

the best thing that could happen to a team so I don't think any other seniors deserve it as much as they do."

"It was great," Clinger said. "If we had lost it would have been really sad but there is not a better way to go out. It's the best anyone could do and we did it."

"Besides being great ball players, (Swoopes and Kirkland) are great people and I'm just so glad that I was able to be a part of it, get to know them and be able to play with them."

Swoopes, who earned the Most Valuable Player Award for the NCAA Tournament, reflected what her fellow seniors said.

"It's unbelievable," she said. "It's great and I'll never forget it. Just to end your senior year winning the Final Four — that's just great."

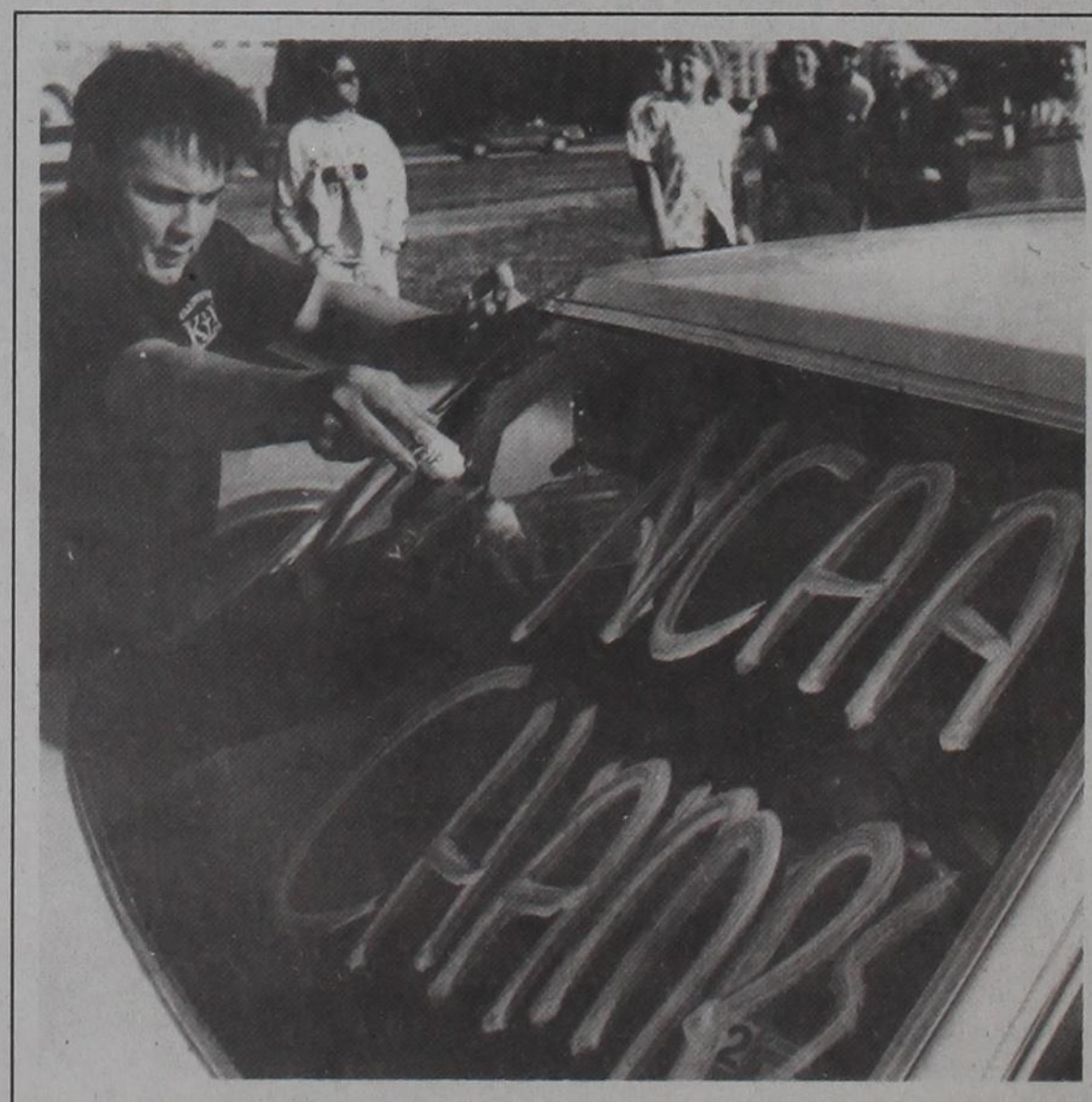
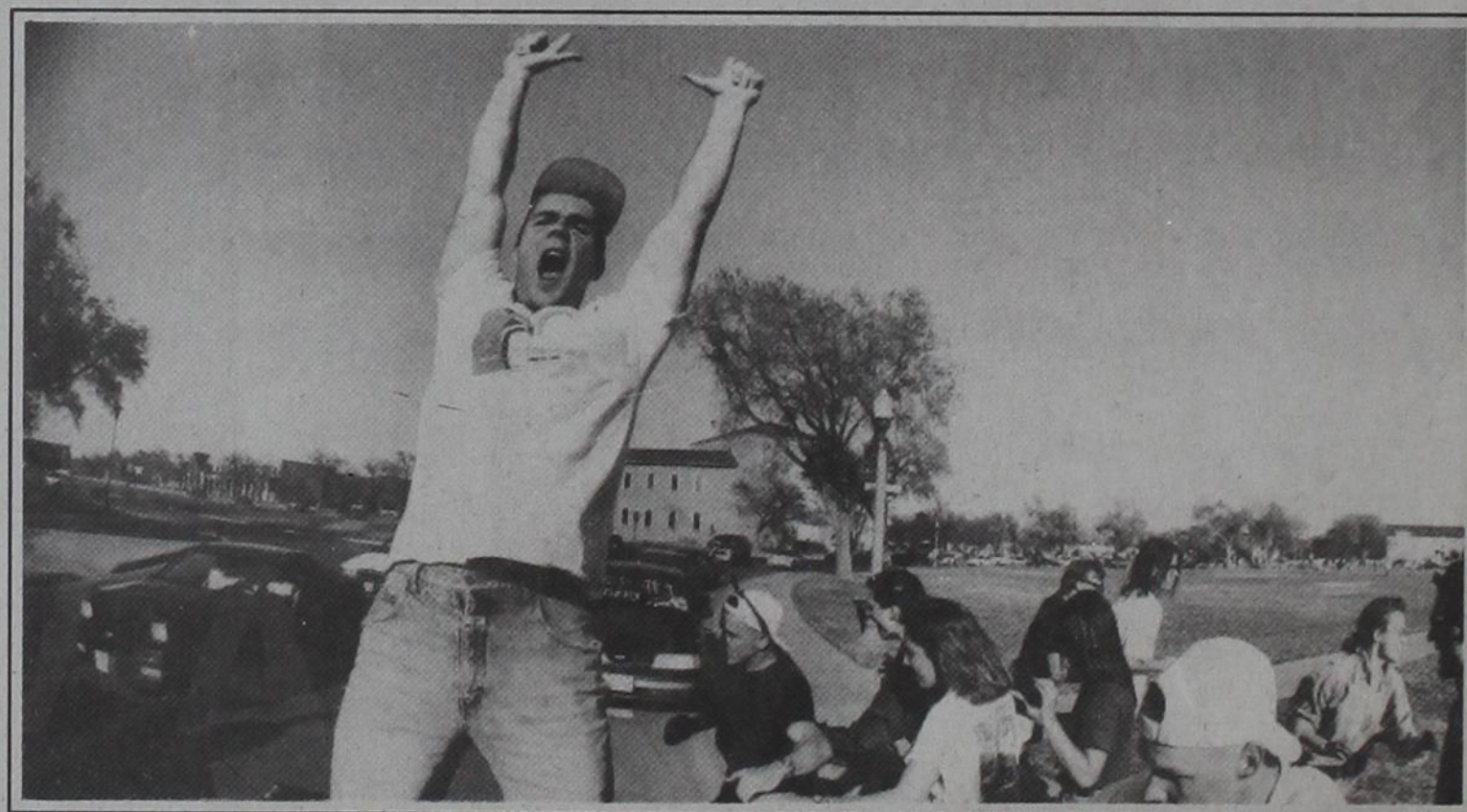
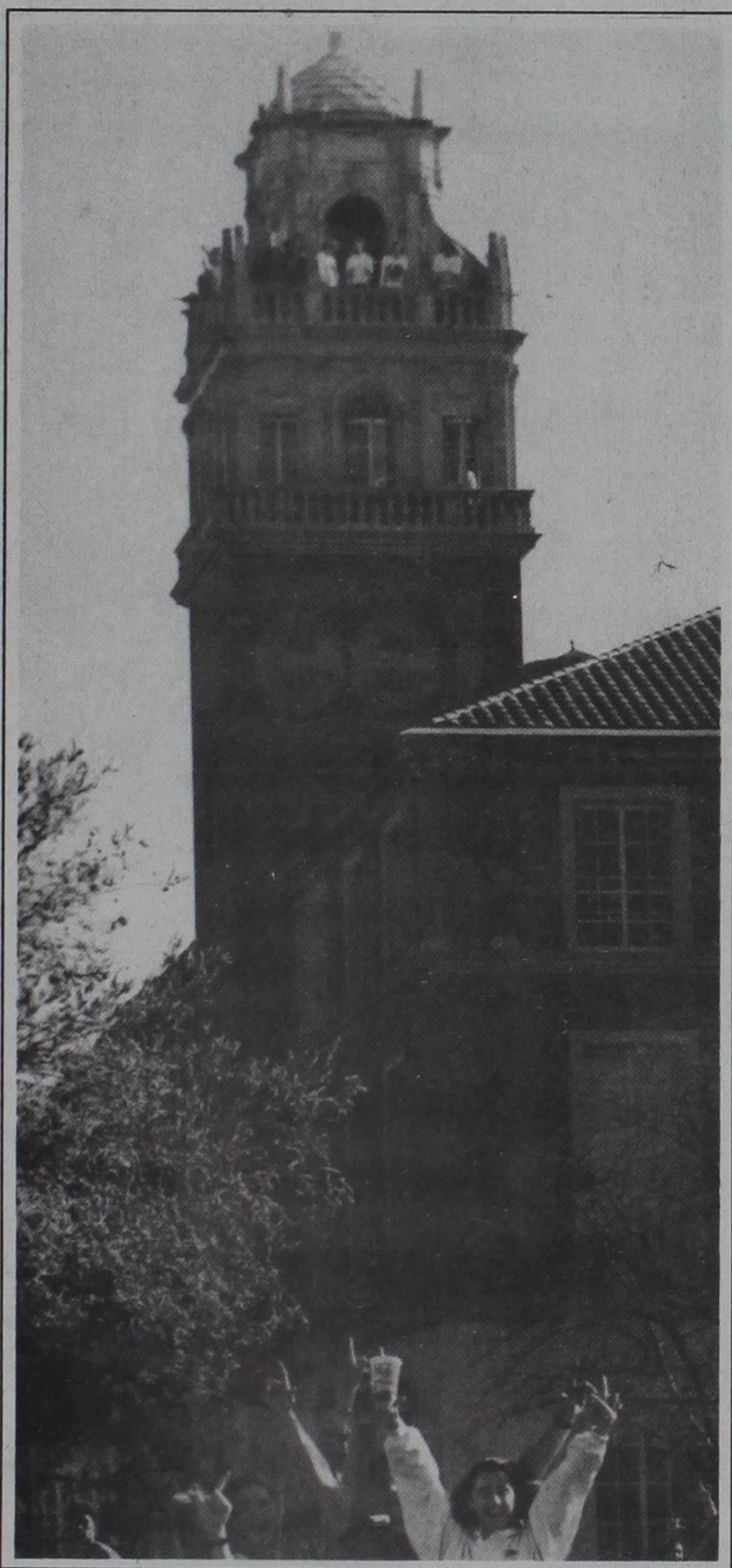
fought their way to the national title. "I figured that everybody's up here having fun," said sophomore mechanical engineering major Brad Vickers, who watched the game at Conference Cafe.

Campus erupts after Lady Raider win

They say yelling "Fire!" in a crowded movie theater is dangerous — try yelling it in the middle of Memorial Circle after Texas Tech claims the NCAA Division I National Championship.

"What can you say? This is great," said Michael Frazier, a sophomore business management major, from atop the Will Rogers and Soapsuds statue. "Less than a month ago, the people on this campus hated each other, and now this brought us together."

Within minutes after the Lady Raiders prevailed over the Ohio State Buckeyes, thousands of Tech fans poured onto campus with guns up and horns honking.

Spirited students and fans converged on campus to celebrate Tech's first national championship and listen to a Tech tradition never before carried out.

The Tech victory bells began ringing at about 5:15 p.m. Sunday and rang until early Monday morning to mark the first national title to be won by Tech. The bells usually ring for 30 minutes following a win.

High Riders and Saddle Tramps shared the around-the-clock ringing duties at the bell tower located on the administration building's east side.

Human pyramids and vehicles loaded with screaming and flag-waving Techsians were just a few examples of how fans showed their pride and support for the Lady Raiders.

Camcorders could be spotted all around Memorial Circle, capturing the excitement and antics of proud Lady Raider fans.

Members of the Goin' Band from Raiderland also made an appearance, leading the crowd in the fight song and alma mater.

With the Tech win, Student Association President Chris Loveless won a bet with Ohio State Student Body President John Hilbert, who will have to wear a new Texas Tech NCAA National Champions T-shirt for one full day at school and at his next student senate meeting.

"This is the greatest thing to happen to Tech in a long time," said Pong Anderson, a sophomore management information systems major. "I definitely expected the crowd (at Memorial Circle)."

Jayson Lavender, a sophomore recreation and leisure services major, said he was at the University of Kansas two years ago when the Jayhawks played in the Final Four. He said many Kansas fans celebrated on campus after the game, so Lavender and his friends also decided to head for the Tech campus after watching the game at home.

"Looks like everyone else had the same idea," he said.

Local radio station FM-99 prompted listeners to meet at Memorial Circle for an impromptu pep rally following the win.

"This is our party," said FM-99's General Manager Chuck Heinz.

"This is for Lubbock and the Lady Raiders."

Mary Susan Spears, a senior dietician major, said she watched the game from her room in Wall Residence Hall.

"You could hear the whole floor screaming," she said. "After the game, I heard all the honking and thought I'd come out and see what was going on. It's the first traffic jam in Tech history of people wanting to hear the bells and celebrate."

Spears was at the airport to welcome the Lady Raiders back from their West Region Championship at Missoula, Mont., and said she would not be stopped from attending today's 8 p.m. pep rally in Jones Stadium.

Proud Tech students weren't the only ones celebrating the victory. Many mini-Techsians also cheered on campus for the national champions.

"I'm happy for Sheryl Swoopes, especially," said 11-year-old Jessica Romo. "We watch them all the time, and we'll all be there (at the pep rally)."

Twelve-year honorary Saddle Tramp Bob Sulligan and his wife, Janey, both employed at Tech, added to the celebration by continuously playing Queen's "We are the Champions" on their portable stereo.

"Tech has needed this kind of spirit for a long time," said Keith Abbott, a junior biology major. "The national publicity is going to do a lot of good for our (university)."

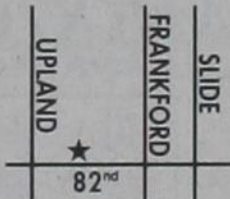

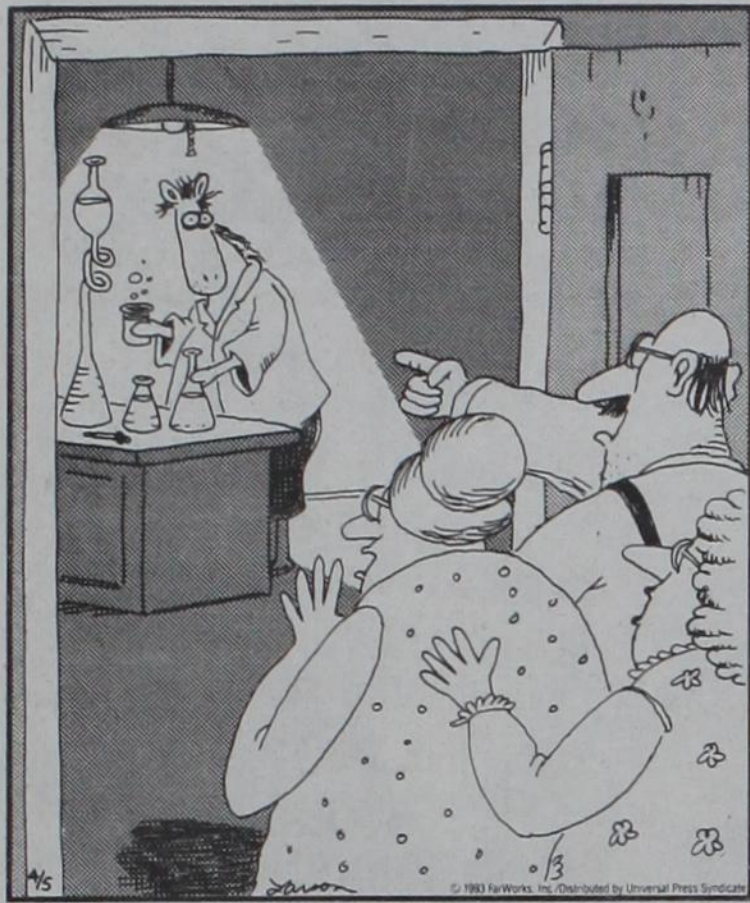

Senate adds student to Tech's Board of Regents

The Texas Senate paved the way Wednesday for a student to be a member of a university's board of regents by unanimously approving a bill submitted by Sen. Jim Turner, D-Crockett.

"Students from around the state of Texas, and particularly those in the Texas Students Association, asked me to sponsor this bill last fall so they could provide ideas and information to their board of regents," Turner said. "I am pleased this bill enjoyed the unanimous support of my colleagues."

The advisory student liaison position created by Senate Bill 254 will be a part of the boards at Texas' 13 university systems.

The student liaisons will be selected by the governor, who will select the students from a list of nominees presented by each university's student government.

The students will not be paid for serving on the board, but university student service fees will pay their expenses.

The students will provide student input to the boards and representation in the educational process, which will make the system better, Turner said.

He said students deserve input in the decision-making process because the state's universities exist for their benefit.

The students will serve a one-year term, beginning Sept. 1.

Student advisory members cannot serve two consecutive terms.

Texas Tech Regent Elizabeth "Cissy" Ward said it will be difficult for students to feel comfortable working on the board because they only will serve a one-year term.

However, Ward said she is not opposed to student representation on the board.

The student liaison will not be allowed to vote or to attend executive sessions. Students who miss two consecutive board meetings will be removed from office and replaced by another nominee.

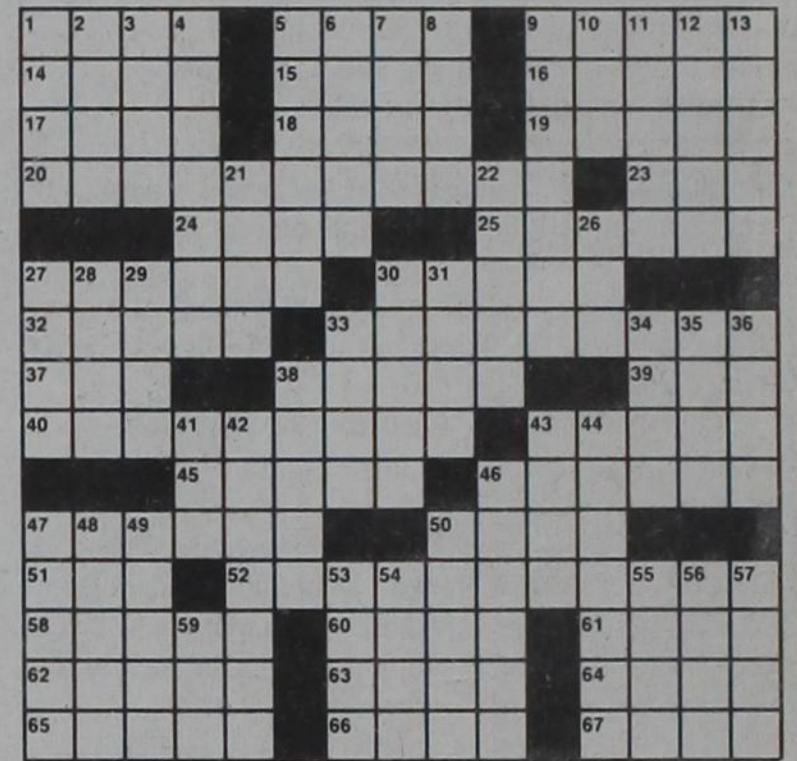
Ward said she hopes Tech's board already provides an opportunity to hear student concerns on issues.

Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos, D-Austin, co-sponsored the Senate bill.

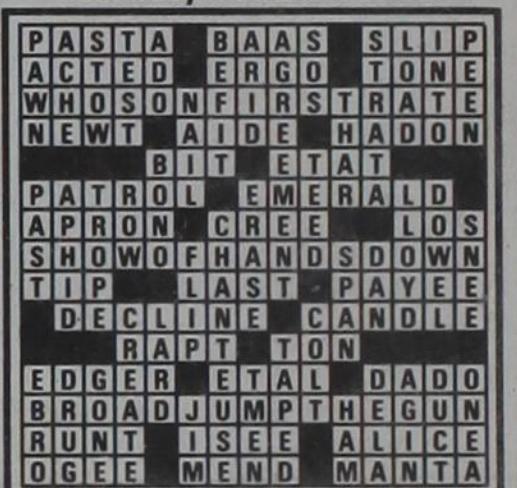

Becoming the Masked Rider is a dream come true, Gilbreath said.

"It's one of the main reasons I came to Tech," she said. "A lot of the Masked Rider is PR for Tech. It was for me. It was great to see that black horse."

As the Masked Rider, Gilbreath said she will raise money for the Masked Rider Endowment Fund and encourage children to pursue the dream of becoming Tech's Masked Rider.

With some last minute advice for Gilbreath before handing over the reins, Spence said, "I know that she'll get discouraged sometimes, but there's a hundred-fold more good rewards than drawbacks."

"Watch out for those referees," he said. "People don't realize that accidents are going to happen."

Raiders take two of three from Cougars

No. 12-ranked Texas Tech continued to roll through the Southwest Conference by taking two of three games from the Houston Cougars this weekend at Cougar Field in Houston.

Tech opened the series with a 13-2 win on Friday, giving Travis Driskill his third victory of the SWC season. The Red Raiders then split the doubleheader on Saturday, losing the first game 3-1 and winning a rain-shortened second game by a 4-3 margin.

With the wins Tech improved its season record to 29-8, while boosting its conference record to 7-2. Houston is now 2-10 in the SWC and 22-17 overall. This series ended the first half of the conference season for Tech, with Texas A&M, Texas and Texas Christian remaining on the league schedule for the Raiders.

Driskill pitched a complete game against the Cougars on Friday allowing two runs on nine hits and striking out three Houston hitters in the 13-2 blowout. Driskill's record now stands

at 7-2 and 3-0 in league play.

Center fielder Mike Kinney led the way with four hits on Friday, while Clint Bryant, Randy DuRoss and John Tole each had doubles in the contest.

The first game on Saturday saw starting pitcher J.J. Varney go six innings, giving up three runs on four hits, while the Cougars' Jeremy Tyson picked up the win.

Matt Smith had two hits in the game for the Raiders, while second baseman Trey Forkerway scored

Tech's only run in the 3-1 loss.

The second game was stopped after the sixth inning when a rain storm soaked the field, with senior pitcher John Macatee getting the win.

Forkerway had two hits in the contest, while also scoring one run in the 4-3 victory. Macatee's record stands at 5-2 overall.

Tech will return home to take on the College of the Southwest Mustangs at 5 p.m. Tuesday in a doubleheader at Dan Law Field.

Hall leads way on 17-play drive to vault Red over Black 20-10

At times during Saturday's Red-Black game, Spike Dykes' crew left many unanswered questions after the Red team defeated the Black 20-10 at Jones Stadium. But there were also times when Tech's defense and offense looked in mid-season form as Robert Hall and company performed well. Welcome to spring training.

The Red team was led by Hall's 18 of 27 passing for 184 yards. Hall's day also included a back-breaking 17-play drive that provided the final margin of victory.

Hall's performance was almost to be expected, but the touchdown drive showed that Tech may still have some work to do on its new defense.

The Raiders are going with a 4-4 defense this season, scrapping last year's often generous 3-4 alignment. The 4-4 lines up four defensive linemen, three linebackers, three defensive backs, and the "Raider," or a roving defensive back who can also play outside linebacker.

Freshman Marcus Coleman, a strong safety last season, started out spring training as the Raider back, but has since been moved back to his original position at free safety.

The switch leaves several possibilities at the new position, but as yet no one has stepped forward to lock

up the position. At times, it was apparent Tech's offense was well ahead of the fledgling defense.

Both teams were able to score on their opening drives. The Red team drew first blood after Byron "Bam" Morris carried defenders in for a five-yard touchdown run. But quarterback Jason Clemons and the Black squad came right back with its own scoring drive, capped off by a Jon Davis 19-yard field goal.

After two Bobby Buntyn field goals put the Red team ahead 13-3, sophomore running back Claskell Freeman brought the Black squad as close as it would ever get at 13-10. Freeman's touchdown was his fifth in the past four intrasquad games. He finished the game with 69 yards on nine carries to lead all rushers.

For the Black squad, Clemmons could only muster a 3 of 15 passing performance and was sacked four times. To compound matters for Clemmons, second-team All-American Lloyd Hill was a surprising non-factor with no catches and Tech's second-leading receiver, Derrell Mitchell, was held to just one catch for 30 yards.

Tech senior defensive end Shawn Jackson had one of the better performances for the Raiders with two sacks. Jackson, earlier demoted to second team behind Damon Wickware, was recently reinstated into the starting lineup for the Raiders.

Tech topples Commodores 60-46

Vandy coach becomes believer of Swoopes' talent

ATLANTA - The Lady Raiders gave Vanderbilt a present the No. 1 team in the nation rarely receives in Saturday's NCAA Championship semifinal — a scratch in the loss column.

Texas Tech thumped the top-ranked Commodores 60-46 to advance to Sunday's national championship game behind All-America Sheryl Swoopes' 31 points.

"Sheryl Swoopes is arguably the best player I've seen in a long time," Vanderbilt coach Jim Foster said after watching the Commodores lose for just the third time this season. "(Swoopes) came out of nowhere to get rebounds a couple of times. I don't know if you even saw the best of her today. Today Texas Tech was the better basketball team."

In the first half, Swoopes, who became women's basketball unanimous player of the year this weekend, scored

15 points, two on free throws boosting the 6-foot senior into second place on the Tech all-time scoring list.

Krista Kirkland scored seven first half points to help give the Lady Raiders a 28-26 halftime lead.

The Commodores defense made it difficult for Tech to get inside, forcing the Lady Raiders to the perimeter.

"We did have to play the perimeter game and a lot of kids played really hard," coach Marsha Sharp said after the game. "And, of course, Gillingham intimidates shooters in the middle so I thought our post players were really patient in there but at the same time we were not able to create much offense."

Tech made 48 percent of its first half field goals while limiting Vandy

to 40 percent from the field.

Swoopes was the only player from either team to go to the free-throw line in the first half, hitting both shots.

Despite Vanderbilt's size advantage, the Lady Raiders won the rebounding battle 17-12 in the first half.

Tech increased its lead by four points within the first minute of the second half and the Commodores were able to keep pace with the Lady Raiders for a time. But after Swoopes made a layup to start a second half 8-0 run, Vanderbilt could only pull within three points, the last time coming with 4:49 left.

In the final 10 seconds of the game, guards Noel Johnson and Kirkland kept the ball on the Tech side of the court playing keep-away with Vanderbilt to run out the clock.

"If you had told me before the game we would beat Vandy 60-46, I'd have said you were crazy," assistant coach Roger Reding said after the game. "We are so happy to be here. It's like a dream come true."

Does reality exist after taking National Championship?

ATLANTA — Reality no longer exists. How else can you explain it?

Teams like Texas Tech win national championships in the movies. It's fitting that in the city made

famous by *Gone With The Wind*; the city that rose up from the ashes after Sherman's Army burned it to the ground; that the Lady Raiders would rise from the shadows of the nations' elite teams and burn Ohio State 84-82 for the NCAA national championship.

The Buckeyes can only wonder what many have wondered as Tech made its way through bigger, higher-ranked teams at the Final Four: How?

How does a Tech team that's tallest player is 6-foot 2-inches tall outperform a Vanderbilt squad that starts 6-10 center Heidi Gillingham 42-27.

How does a Tech team shoot 54.7 percent from the field against an Ohio State team that had been limiting opponents to 42.4 percent shooting during the tournament?

By suspending reality for 48 hours in Atlanta.

Senior forward Sheryl Swoopes was unreal.

Nobody goes to the Final Four and scores 31 and 47 points.

Senior guard Krista Kirkland was unreal.

Like Swoopes, the pride of Sudan and Spearman played all 40 minutes of the semifinal and championship games. Kirkland was 5-of-11 from 3-point range and had five steals.

Tech certainly was not the Cinderella at this ball. No, Tech was as pretty as any team here, earning a No. 2 seed in the West Region and disposing of three quality teams en route to the final four.

Certainly Swoopes, the National Player of the year, brought some credibility to this upstart program from the hinterlands of West Texas.

UNDERSTANDING THE MAGNITUDE OF THEIR ACCOMPLISHMENT WAS THE ONLY OPPONENT THE LADY RAIDERS FOUND TROUBLE DISPOSING OF THIS WEEKEND.

Problem was, most people hadn't seen the Lady Raiders' textbook style of team-oriented basketball.

Those who had, knew they had a chance.

But against top-ranked Vanderbilt and the physical play of Big Ten power Ohio State? Once again you only need to suspend a little reality and add a dash of Swoopes to understand.

Understanding the magnitude of their accomplishment was the only opponent the Lady Raiders found trouble disposing of this weekend.

To a woman they spoke about how unreal and hard to comprehend the victory was. Was this the greatest experience in their life? Yes. Can you explain how it feels? No.

The genesis of this spell-binding championship team goes back to an emotion-wracked night in Dallas in March of 1991.

It was there the Lady Raiders beat Texas for the first time ever, the win coming in the semifinals of the SWC tournament.

That milestone win put into motion a series of events that included two SWC crowns, two Post-Season Classic championships and culminated in this season's national title.

People will forget that Tech was 20-11 and 23-8 the two years before Sheryl Swoopes arrived to reshape the world of women's basketball.

Names like Karen Farst, Tami Wilson, Teresa McMillan and Jennifer Buck stand out as the builders of Tech's program.

It was with the satisfaction of a parent watching a child reach a dream that Buck, Wilson and McMillan shed tears of joy in the stands mere feet away from the team they had helped shape into champions. It is as much a

victory for the past as it is for the present.

The roots of this unbelievable win stem from an intense team concept shared by the best women's player ever and the teammates who gave her the freedom to play to her potential.

All knew they could go as far as they dreamed as long as each member contributed their special talent.

For Swoopes it was scoring, passing and anything else you can name.

For Kirkland it was 3-point shooting and the leadership only a fourth-year player can bring to the floor.

For Cynthia Clinger it was the ability to run any other post player off the court.

For Stephanie Scott it was playing a hell-bent for leather style of defense that wilted opponents.

For Noel Johnson it was ice-cold decisiveness in running the offense and hitting the clutch shot.

For reserves Janice Farris and Michi Atkins it was the ability to enter a heated contest, maintain the pace and play with the cool of a hired gun coming in to rid the town of vermin.

Brownfield native adds more records to list

Swoopes scores most points in tournament

ATLANTA — When people go on a vacation, they usually take what they need and bring back more than they left with. Texas Tech All-American Sheryl Swoopes is no exception.

Although Swoopes went to Atlanta for something other than a vacation, she will return to Lubbock today with a few extra items among her Final Four baggage.

Thursday Swoopes received the Champion National Player of the Year Award with tears of gratitude in her eyes.

The next day, Swoopes was awarded her second appointment to the Kodak All-America team.

In the semifinal game of the Final Four in Atlanta's Omni, Swoopes' 31 points led not only all scorers in the Tech/Vanderbilt game but it also was more than any player tallied in the Ohio State/Iowa game. It also was more than any player registered in the men's Final Four semifinal games in New Orleans.

For that reason, Dick Schapp Sunday named Swoopes the Most Valuable Player in both men's and women's Final Fours in a commentary on ESPN.

After scoring her first 15 points in Saturday's game against Vanderbilt, Swoopes moved into second place among Tech's all-time leading scorers and after scoring four of her 47 on Sunday, she broke the record for the highest points scored in a tournament, ending up with 177.

And the list goes on.

Swoopes set NCAA tourney records for most free throws made, 57, most field goals made with 56, most points in a Final Four, 78, most field goals attempted in a Final Four, 27, and the most points scored in a championship game, men's or women's, with 47 points.

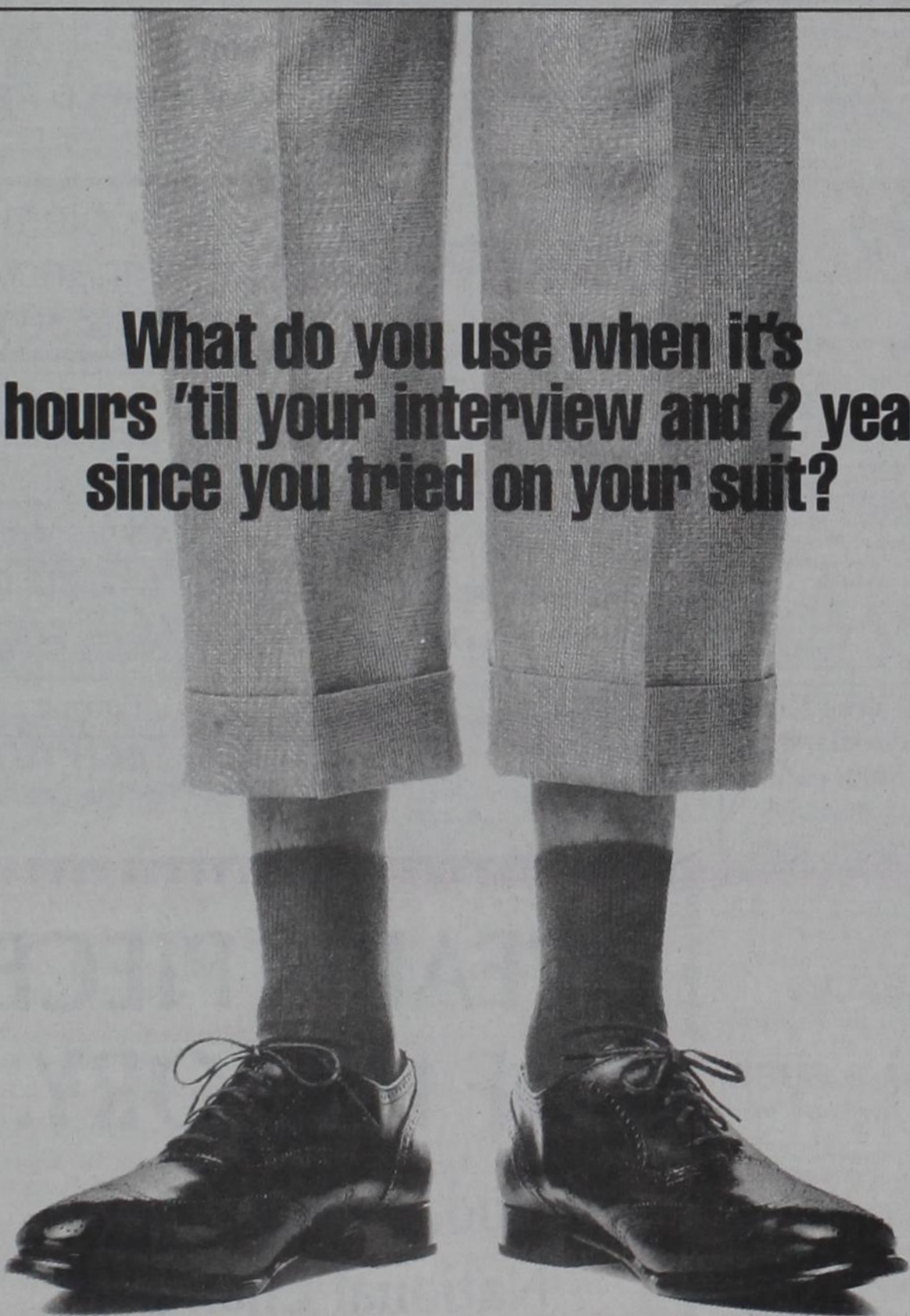
In Dallas, the postseason tournament was called "Hoopla Dallas."
