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Yugoslavia ordered to stop genocide

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — Bosnian's embattled Muslim government won a moral victory Thursday when the World Court ordered Yugoslavia to stop acts of genocide.

But the 14 judges did not deal with Bosnia's request for an exemption from the U.N. weapons embargo against the former Yugoslav states.

While the emergency measures can sway world opinion, the court has no enforcement powers. Its rulings can be enforced by the U.N. Security Council, although none ever have.

Bosnia's chief counsel, Francis Boyle, said the Muslimled government would use the ruling to exert pressure on the Security Council to tighten sanctions against Serbia. The court may issue further rulings in the case.



Leaders to relive Washington march

WASHINGTON (AP) -Calling for a renewed commitment to end the "violence of racism and poverty," Coretta Scott King and fellow civil rights leaders announced plans Thursday for a 30th anniversary March on Washington.

"The critical issues that faced us in 1963 are unfortunately still with us today," said Mrs. King, the widow of Martin Luther King Jr. "We cannot give up, or give out, if we are to fulfill Dr. King's dream, and our dream, of a better America."

The march would commemorate the historic rally led by Dr. King that concluded with his "I have a dream" speech before about 250,000 demonstrators at the Lincoln Memorial

Mrs. King said "hundreds of thousands" are expected at the Washington Monument on Aug. 28. The twentieth anniversary of the 1963 march drew 300,000.



O'Leary defends supercollider project

WAXAHACHIE (AP) - Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary allayed fears Thursday that she is lukewarm on the super collider, calling the giant atom smasher "science that has been dreamed of for decades."

O'Leary's visit was her first to the super collider, which would be the world's largest scientific experiment. Backers of the project used the visit to personally gauge O'Leary's level of commitment to the \$8.25 billion project.

Collider supporters became concerned earlier this year when O'Leary told reporters that she does "not feel passionately" about the project. "This issue becomes, can we afford this?"

One collider official, speaking on condition of anonymity, said "there are mixed signals" from O'Leary on the project.

Lake project delayed

ACT helping students assess financial future

Before filling out mounds of financial aid paperwork, students can get an estimate of their financial aid eligibility from American College Testing by sending in a one-page form.

"This program is primarily targeted at high school students who are planning their college careers," said Joan Anderson, an ACT specialist. "But this is certainly an excellent tool for college students who are unsure about their financial aid."

ACT offers a one-hour fax service for the estimates provided through the Financial Aid Need Estimator program. The ACT office staff sends back students' mail requests within one day of receiving them.


"This service also allows students to find out the costs associated with colleges they might consider attending," Anderson said.

"It gives parents and students and idea about how to plan for expenses," she said.

Funding disputes have caused the Lake Meredith desalinization project to remain in legislative limbo despite legislative approval last year of the package in which the project stands.

Appropriations for the project have been held up by unrelated water projects in California that also are included in the package.

Before the desalting process can begin, approval of funding appropriations for one-third of the package must be given.

The 11 cities that rely on Lake Meredith as a water source, including Lubbock, Slaton, Brownfield, Levelland and Plainview, have committed money to fund one-third of the project with the state approving funds to cover another one-third. Desalting the water source is necessary for citizens who receive water from

Lake Meredith, said U.S. Rep. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, while addressing the project's future during last week's meeting of the House Appropriations' subcommittee on energy and water development. The maximum level of chlorides recommended by the Texas Department

of Health and the Environmental Protection Agency is 250 milligrams per liter. Lake Meredith levels are at 400 milligrams per liter because of seepage of salt brine into the Canadian River that supplies water to the lake.

Combest also said the water conditions are responsible for corroding pipes and other devices through which water is transferred

"This is much more than a matter of taste," Combest said during the subcommittee meeting. "The high salt level corrodes pipes and air conditioners and threatens recreation and fish and wildlife."

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Minority recruiting

Tech should take the lead

The Institution of Affirmative Action is a target of conservatives throughout our country and for good reason. If all things were equal then I would greatly oppose it, but as we know, all things are not equal. There is a large segment of society that has only been "Constitutionally" equal for

about 130 years.

In a conversation about solutions for our racial tensions, a president of a traditionally white fraternity stated, "I've been up here for four years and I've only had one black teacher and maybe two Hispanic."

He's got me beat. I've only had white professors. The only non-white teachers I've had have been TAs in the foreign language or mathematics subjects. He went on to say that it would be nice to get a different perspective of history, philosophy or any other subjective discipline. If we had such diversity, people would get an intellectual insight into our differences.

But, Kenneth, you are limited to your course load. Surely there are full-time black faculty members at our school. I thought I'd ask around and see what's up. I asked some faculty about the situation and got some numbers from the Affirmative Action office.

Out of the 780 full-time faculty at Texas Tech there are seven blacks and 12 Hispanics, (less than 3 percent). That is not equality. This shows that our school is still in the Dark Ages (no pun intended) when it comes to equality in faculty. I wonder what the numbers would be if we didn't have an Affirmative Action office.

MY QUESTION: DOES THE TECH ADMINISTRATION ACT WITH THE SAME ZEAL AND ENTHUSIASM WHEN RECRUTING BLACK FACULTY AS TECH COACHES WHEN RECRUITING BLACK ATHLETES?

I was told that there is no social life for black intellectuals in Lubbock.

I was told that Tech has tried, but has had no success in minority recruiting.

I was also told that there are not a lot of minorities qualified to be full-time professors.

Some aspects of the aforementioned may have some basis in fact, but there is a certain hypocrisy in this matter. Faculty is recruited.

Every year after the last game, Tech football coaches gas up their cars, purchase numerous plane tickets and write hundreds of handwritten letters recruiting the best athletes throughout our whole country. Over half I would wager are black. They sell this university and the Lubbock community to young men. They steal recruits from other more "attractive" schools and entice these black athletes to come and make millions of dollars for Tech. (Check the roster.)

My question: Does the Tech administration act with the same zeal and enthusiasm when recruiting black faculty as Tech coaches when recruiting black athletes?

I think not.

I will not call this racism. Too often minorities use that word as a crutch. I'll chalk it up to an oversight in judgement and prevailing West Texas attitudes.


If all people who voiced opinions against the Pikes and Fashion Board really are concerned with the importance of diversity and crosscultural understanding, then the pressure on the administration to hire and recruit qualified minority faculty should be substantial. The actions of the groups are not the source of racial ignorance, they are the product.

I have faith in our school. If I didn't, I would have transferred years ago. I have faith in our president. He's a good man and respects the position of minority students. He asks for suggestions and has positive objectives. My criticism lies in the fact that as a university, Tech has not maximized its potential.

Texas Tech is a major university, but acts like a struggling grammar school. We feel inferior to UT and A&M and constantly complain about funding. Here is an opportunity for Tech to blaze a trail and improve our image by instituting fair faculty hiring practices.

Immediate action in the area of equity in faculty would be more effective than a symbolic "Unity Day" where we act like everything is fine and smile for the brochure.

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

IRVING(AP)—Steve Beuerlein's search to find an NFL team willing to pay him the millions he feels he's worth on the open market seems to be leading him right back to the Dallas Cowboys.

Troy Aikman's backup may indeed find himself hanging his cleats next season in the same stall he's occupied at the Cowboys Valley Ranch headquarters the past two years.

To keep Beuerlein, Dallas would have to pay him about \$1.5 million for one season. That's about \$1 million dollars more than Beuerlein made last season.

Cowboys officials also have ex- 18 Human rights pressed a willingness to consider signing Beuerlein to a long-term deal that would pay him about \$2 million a season.

Beuerlein became popular with 24 A Costello Dallas fans when he stepped in and led the Cowboys to a string of victories on the way to an 11-5 regular season record and wild card playoff berth.

But Cowboys coach Jimmy Johnson has made it clear that Aikman will be the main man in Dallas for many years to come.

Aikman started every game for 42 Board member: Dallas last season, and Beuerlein made it known that he was not willing to 44 Self spend the rest of his career riding the 45 One-trillionth: bench.

Finding a team to pay him the annual \$2.8 million he's seeking hasn't been easy.

Beuerlein's quest has been complicated by other free agent quarterbacks, 55 Follower: suff. such as San Francisco's Joe Montana, also shopping their services around the league. Montana is a candidate to move to the Kansas City Chiefs, the Phoenix Cardinals and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. The Cardinals, along with the Bucs, have shown the most interest in Beuerlein.



Fourteenth-ranked Texas Tech tied the third-highest point total in the history of the Lady Raiders' program Saturday night, rolling over Texas Christian 111-65 at Daniel-Meyer Coliseum in Fort Worth.

With the majority of the 1,175 fans in attendance waving guns up for Tech, senior forward Sheryl Swoopes gave the crowd something to cheer about with 27 points in the first half as the Lady raiders went in at the break with 58-28 lead. Tech, which has never lost to TCU in women's basketball, boosted its record to 14-3, 4-1 after handling the Frogs, 8-9, 0-6, their 31st straight Southwest Conference loss. The last conference game TCU won was against Rice in the 1990-91 season.

Senior guard Krista Kirkland hit 50 percent of her 3-point attempts, converting 9-of-14 from the floor and finishing with 21 points. Swoopes led all scorers with 30.

Coach Marsha Sharp's entire roster scored points to help the Lady Raiders hit the 100-point mark for the third time in the last four games. When the team hit the century mark on Saturday, for the second-straight game, it marked a first in the school record books for that feat. Michi Atkins scored 14 points to score in double figures for the fifth time in as many games.

Sharp said she was happy with the victory and that the points scored could help her team gain confidence.


