Farmers Faced With Fuel Shortage

Critical Shortage May Hamper '73 Harvest

Indian Summer on the South Plains is in the process of maturing one of the best crops this area has produced in a number of years.

The farmer's main concern at this time, besides weather, is a critical shortage of gasoline and diesel fuel that could be responsible for leaving the harvest in the fields.

Bernis Camp of the Agriculture and Stabilization office located in Muleshoe, said there was practically no gasoline available for running the trucks that are hauling grain from the field to the elevator. He also stated that diesel is becoming a problem in that this fuel is used in many of the combine harvesting crops here this year.

The shortage is expected to worsen before the area harvest has been completed this year. Gary Dale of Gulf Wholesale also stated that the shortage was very critical and that he would probably have trouble supplying his regular customers with fuel before the month is over.

Dale said that so far he was supplying his customers but that the demand was going to be more than his allocation.

He also stated that this was a bad time of the year for fuel since more fuel was being used due to the harvest.

Sam Fox of Texaco, Inc. reported that he was in about the same position as other deal-

ers. He can supply his present customers at the present time, but may run out of fuel before the month is over. He said that he could not take on any more customers at this time due to the critical shortage of fuels.

These dry, hot days of October have been very beneficial to the cotton crops.

Figures show that there will be an estimated 79,000 bales of cotton harvested in Bailey County this year. This will be an increase over last year's total bales of 72,000.

Grain sorghum and shelled corn harvests are both going strong at this time.

Suicide Ruled In Shooting Death Here

Marcelino Rubio Carrasco, 21, was dead on arrival at West Plains Memorial Hospital about 9 p.m. Thursday night. Carrasco suffered a gunshot wound in the head. Justice of the Peace, Morris Nowlin ruled that the wound was self-inflicted.

Sheriff Dee Clements said he was summoned to 1015 W. Avenue C about 9:07 Thursday night and found the man lying in the driveway by a car. He said the man had a bullet hole in the side of his head.

Sheriff Clements told the Journal that he had allegedly been over to the sewing factory where his wife worked and had pulled a gun on her.

He later returned home with his wife where they talked for

awhile and she got him to unload the gun. Later he left the house loading the gun and a few minutes later the wife heard a gunshot. She immediately called the officials.

Carrasco was born April 26, 1952 in Old Mexico. He was employed by Missouri Beef Packers and had been a resident of Muleshoe for about six and a half months, moving from Old Mexico. He was a member of the Catholic Church.

Funeral services are pending at Singleton-Ellis Funeral Home in Muleshoe.

Survivors include his wife, Delia; his father, Nichademos of Ojaniga, Mexico; one sister, Mrs. Marcelina Carranza of Odessa; and one brother, Luz of Colorado.

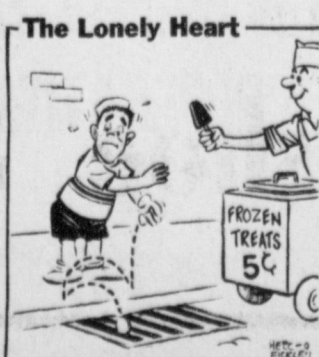
Kathy Burris HERO Student Of The Month

Editorial

The Jewish Problem

All those who lived through the Hitler era sympathize with the world's Jews, and the monstrous atrocities to which so many were subjected.

That, however, doesn't solve today's problems. The United States (through the United Nations) hoped to solve the crux of the problem by the creation of the state of Israel and, over bitter objections, carved this country out of the Middle East at the end of World War II, displacing many Arabs in the process.

Of course, historically Jews had a claim on the land; but one can follow the same reasoning and rearrange all the world's borders many times. So whether this was the answer remains to be seen. Certainly the troubles of recent years in the area, and Israel's expansion, create doubts.

No problem involving only a few million people so dominates world and American politics today, and Jewish demonstrators and agitators are often militant (though not as ruthless as Arab guerrillas).

Critics point to the fact that U.S. relations with Russia may hang in the balance because of arguments over the speed with which the Russians allow Russian Jews to emigrate to Israel. What other group of foreign nationals so dominate U.S. policy? What other foreign citizens group do we consider to be the business of the U.S. Congress?

Critics also point to the growing chance that this country will be dragged into a war against the Arab states, not because the American people favor such a policy, but because of the tremendous political influence of Jews on both U.S. parties. Thus U.S. politicians, including Presidents, are always acting to placate American Jewish organizations and contributors. The Arabs have almost no political clout in Washington.

No one can predict the outcome of the dilemma. But it can be confidently said that there is too much stress on racism and militancy in Jewish (and Arab) circles today. And the fate of no other small group of foreign nationals so dominates America and the news of the day, whatever that may mean for the future.

Agnew Reflections

The current preoccupation with the new Vice President dominates the news but the Spiro Agnew case is still of historical interest to the nation.

Agnew was chosen at the last minute in 1968 as a compromise candidate acceptable to both extremes. Thus not much consideration or investigation had been centered on him.

He brought a forceful, critical voice onto the national scene, so badly needed. He said things which needed to be said, was the rare politician unintimidated by the press and other heretofore sacred, untouchable, pressure groups on the left.

For this the nation is in his debt. That his private activities in Maryland tripped him up is a tragedy because it also discredits his performance as Vice President. On the other hand, the nation is better off that he is not to be the G.O.P. candidate in 1976, and perhaps President.

In retrospect, it's clear Agnew fought a well-calculated battle against his prosecutors, enabling him to escape possibly more severe punishment. It's best for the nation, for many reasons, that its Vice President was fined and not jailed, which would not have helped the image of the nation around the world.

Farmcast

Compiled From Sources Of The Texas Department of Agriculture

What Goes Up Comes Down... Sheep, Lamb Feeding Continue Decline... Red Meat Production Dips.

While much notice was given when farm prices were advancing to new record levels, very little has been said regarding recent farm price declines. Agricultural producers are well aware of price declines during the past few weeks.

Cattle prices, for example, have decreased in price 30 per cent during the past several weeks (the same is true for hogs). The price decline is the biggest since 1950.

It shows again that the law of supply and demand does work in agriculture. As more livestock went to market, the price declined and these downward dips to producers hopefully will result in lower prices for the consumer. Livestock prices—as is the case with all agricultural commodities—will continue to go up and then down. Prices to farmers do in fact fluctuate widely on the short range as well as the long haul. Meanwhile, production costs of farmers remain fairly static and in fact continue to increase in price even though the price that farmers receive for their food and fiber gyrate constantly.

This is one of the lessons in agricultural economics that the general public knows very little about, yet it is basic to farming and ranching.

Texas' farm prices as of Sept. 15 are down two per cent below the previous month.

Beef cattle at \$47.80 per hundred pounds are down \$8.50 from a month ago.

Hogs at \$41.80 were \$14 below last month. Other meat and poultry prices were also below month ago levels. Sheep at \$15, for example, was down \$4.40 per hundredweight from a month ago; lambs were down \$3.90. Broilers were off two cents from last month, and turkeys declined four cents per pound. Egg prices dropped six cents per dozen from a month ago.

Crops showed some price increases, the first in some time. Cotton was up nine cents from a month ago but is still more than 20 cents under parity. Grain sorghum was up 28 cents from a month ago. Wheat was up 23 cents per bushel.

DRYLOT sheep feeders with a lot capacity of 2,000 head or more had 107,000 sheep and lambs on feed for slaughter as of Sept. 1, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

This is nine per cent below the number on feed a month earlier and 10 per cent below the number on feed Oct. 1 of a year ago.

Current intentions to market are: October 47,000; November 33,000, and December 27,000.

Placements during September totaled 34,000 head with a total of 10 feeders reporting 1,000 or more head on feed as of Oct. 1. Marketings during September totaled 50,000 head.

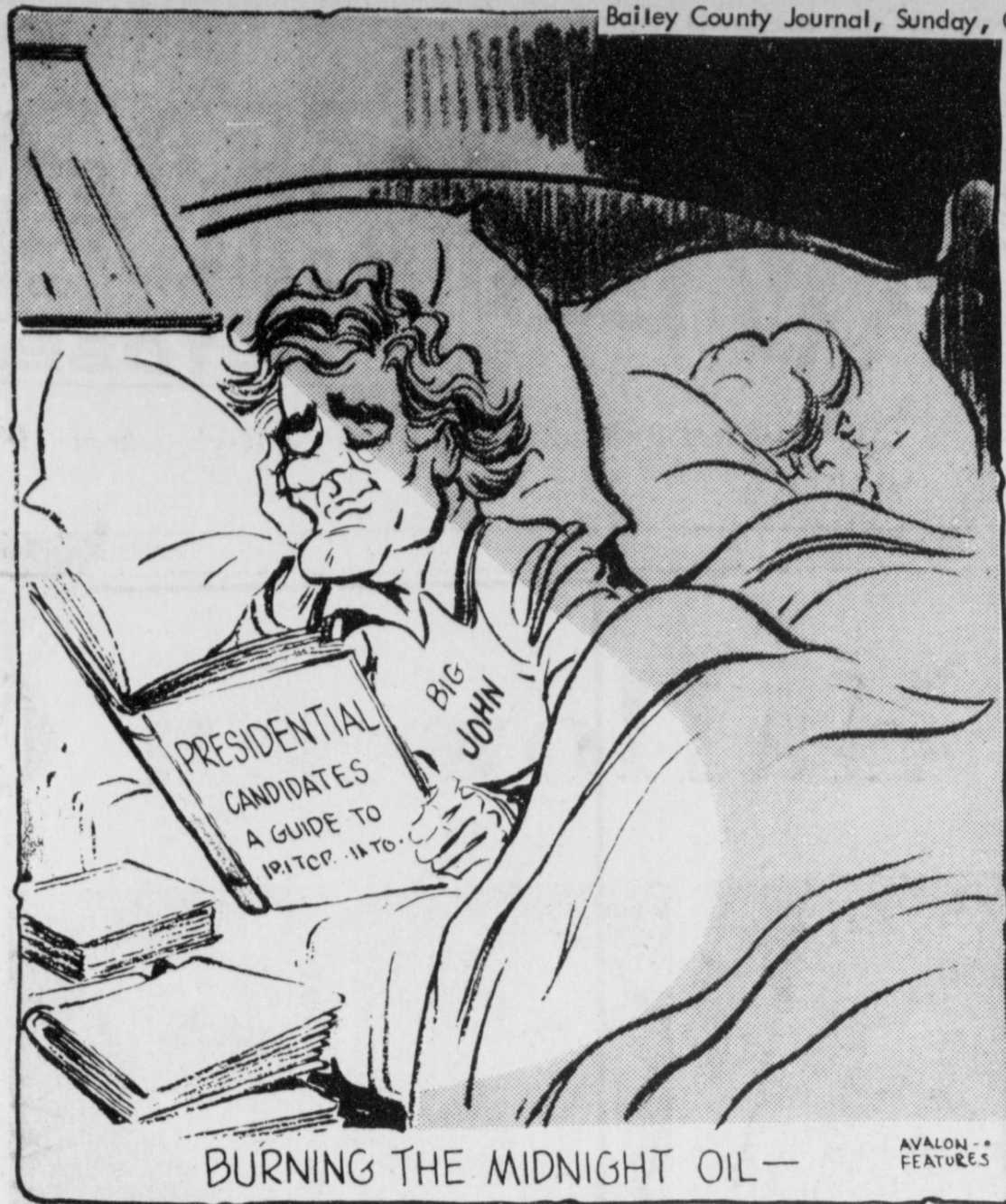
COMMERCIAL slaughter of red meats in Texas is reported to be down three per cent during August and 14 per cent below a year ago.

Cattle slaughtered totaled 290,000 head, which is 8,000 below the number slaughtered a month prior and 42,000 under a year ago.

Hog slaughter is 50,000 less than a year ago. The eight-month cumulative hog kill this year totals 1,068,000.

Calves killed during August was 3,900 above last month but 1,500 less than a year ago.

LIVESTOCK producers are again reminded to continue to submit screwworm samples to the fly laboratory at Mission. Also check your herds regularly and treat wounds on livestock for screwworm control.



NEWS REPORT

WASHINGTON, D.C.—The surprise of the new war in the Middle East is threefold. First, few expected the Arabs to start it at this time.

Second, the initial attack was well planned and carried out with courage. Third, after the initial shock, the Israeli counter-attack met effective opposition which caused heavy losses.

The Arabs have been handicapped by an enormous inferiority complex. If their soldiers become convinced they can win they are more effective, and this seems to be happening.

In the very first days of the war many Israelis were convinced they would make short work of the Arabs. Some confidently predicted they would finish off the Arabs in a few days.

These claims were far too optimistic. The new, highly-mobile SA-6 missile, used by the Arabs for the first time, has been effective against Israeli aircraft on several occasions.

The Arabs also have good, Russian-made tanks, and a numerical edge in armor. Egyptian troops especially seem to be fighting much better than in June, 1967. Obviously, Russian technicians have improved their training.

There is some fear that if enough Arab power can be brought to bear against Israel, the Israelis might resort to nuclear weapons. They are thought to have the component parts for such weapons.

That, however, would almost surely bring Russia into the picture perhaps directly, and risk a U.S.-U.S.S.R. confrontation.

The war could possibly have been avoided if Israel had complied with U.N. resolutions to return Arab land captured in 1967; but many Israelis deny that, and claim that without these captured territories as buffers, Israel might have been overrun in the first days of the war.

WASHINGTON NOTES

KISSINGER PLANS TRIPS

Despite the war in the Middle East, Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger plans two major trips abroad, and will probably visit Korea after traveling to Japan and the People's Republic of China later this month.

STEEL OUTPUT RECORD

U.S. mills produced more steel in the first six months

of 1973 than they did in the first half of any previous year. They poured more than 75.5 million tons.

ON FUEL CURBS

The Nixon Administration has urged voluntary nationwide fuel conservation and warned that failure might lead to rationing.

ON WAR CURBS

The Senate has given final approval to a bill limit-

ing presidential war-making powers. The measure prohibits the President from committing troops to battle for more than 90 days without specific congressional authorization.

CAPE CANAVERAL

Cape Kennedy's original name of Cape Canaveral has been restored by the federal Committee on Geographic Names. The central Florida cape, discovered by Ponce de Leon, has been known as Cape Canaveral since the sixteenth century.

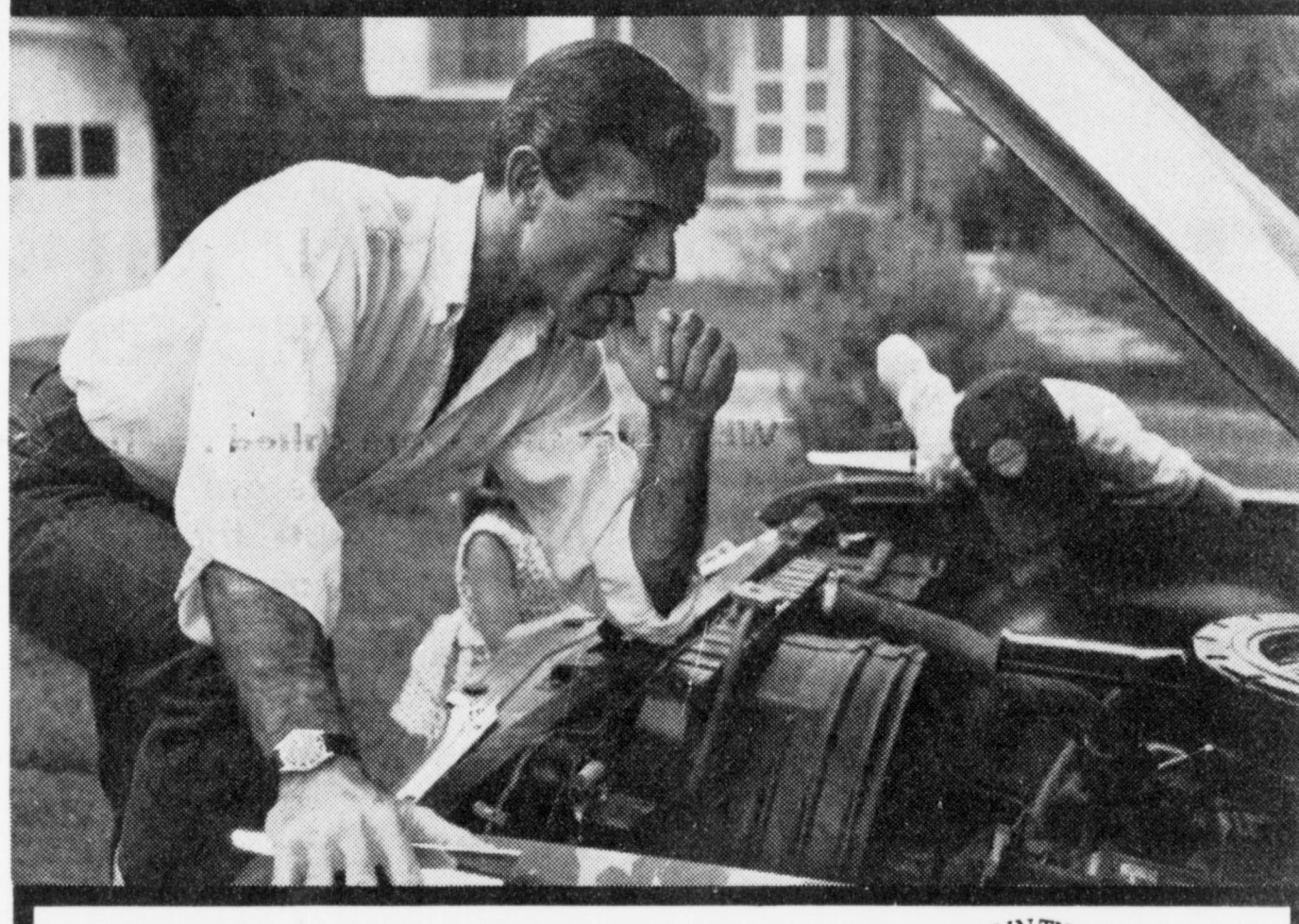
