





33 - Century - Old Amaze E Vitality and

ORLANDO, FLA. — Outside a colonel's office window at the air forces tactical center, within sight of a hangar and celestial navigation towers, garden peas are growing. As is the case with most things at AFTAC, these peas are extraor-

dinary. The tall, healthy vines are los with purple pods, and their ste are thick and branching. Atop the country belowers wave in the Florida sunlight. The original seeds from which these vines sprang were placed by Egyptian priests in laboration with Adolf Hitler's war were placed by Egyptian priests in the tomb of King Tutankhamen 3,300

At least, this is the only theory that fits what facts are known about

the peas' origin. Col. Harlan W. Holden, commandant of the school of applied tactics at AFTAC and present distodian of the King Tut peas, is the man who has done most to stimulate scientific interest in the little vegetables. He has mailed hundreds of seeds from his two crops to experimental and research agencies desiring to experiment with the "new variety." As to the peas' return from the tomb, Colonel Holden makes no claims. He merely points out the window to where the peas are growing and reminds skeptics that so far no one has been able to offer one fact to disprove the story as given to him.

Found by Carter.

This is the history of the King Tut
peas as compiled by Colonel Hol-

den: The original peas came from Howard Carter, who was a member of the Lord Carnervon expedition to King Tut's tomb in 1922 and 1923. Carter found them in an urn in the tomb. They went to Lady Gilbert of "Grimm's Dyke" Harrow Weald. Her head gardener gave some of the peas to Mr. A. A. Aldrige, who after obtaining a parcel of the peas gave two pods to his friend, Mr.

Arthur Easton of Newport, R. I.

After raising one crop, Mr. Easton
presented two of the pods to Maj.

Walter D. Dyer, who planted them
or or active to grow as if they
had into processed to grow as if they had just come from the grocer's. The seeds from this crop, when planted the next year, bore profusely, and Major Dyer harvested about a pound and a half of fresh peas. Some of these he brought with him to the tactical center in Florida, where among a wide variety of military courses there is one on jungle survival.

Immediately intrigued by the peas' background, the commandant of AFTAC's school of applied tactics, Col. Harlan W. Holden, took up agriculture. The season was far from being the prescribed one for pea planting, but Colonel Holden acted on the premise that sand is sand, whether in Egypt or Florida. He also had a hunch that peas which had pulled through three millennia in a tomb could stand off-season cultivation. On April 10, 1944, after the regular Florida pea crop was finished, he planted about 60 seeds from the Rhode Island germination in the sand-based soil just outside his office.

Any gardener in this part of the country will tell you that you can't raise peas in this area in the spring.
As a matter of fact, they told
Colonel Holden that; and while he
patiently listened to them over the phone, he looked out the window at the healthy vines.

Bug and Disease Prof.
Hardly were the Ast sprouts out of the ground when they started trying to set an altitude record. In the first eight weeks they grew 51/2 feet while the natives scratched puzzled heads. By the 4th of July Colonel Holden, who stand 6 feet, 2 inches himself, was looking up to count the budding pods at the tops of the vines.

Corp. Merle Tibbets, jungle survival non com, was fertilizing and watering the vines one day when he noticed another remarkable thing about these plants. Whereas the usual worms, green lice, and beetles continued to chew up surrounding vegetation, they spurned completely the Egyptian intruders. As one sergeant observed, perhaps the garden pests feared some kind of "King Tut curse," but leaving that the paside the matter still was plained.







LESSON TEXT—I Kings 12:28-30; 19:1-4, 13b-18; II Kings 17:7, C.

GOLDEN TEXT—O magnify the Lord with me, and let us exalt His name together.—Psalm 34:3.

Nations as well at people come to crossroads in their history, and taking the wrong sad then means future disaster. So mon had built up a great nation prosperity, but at the disaster of say taxes. He had forgotten God, and was succeeded by a son who followed in his footsteps.

Offered an opportunity to ease the burden of the people (I Kings 12-14), Rehoboam in his folly made it greater, and the nation was divided. The ten northern tribes, which were henceforth to be known as Israel, followed Jeroboam, and the two southern tribes under Rehoboam be-

came the kingdom of Judah.

Jeroboam started with God's
favor, and might have led his people aright, but instead he became the king whose name stood for wickedness (see II Kings 15:18). The story of that downfall is a sad picture of

unbelief and failure.

I. Religion Meets Politics (I Kings 12:26-30).

Jerusalem, now in the rival kingdom of Judah, was the center of Hebrew worship. While the people of Israel were free to go there to worship, Jeroboam saw that it might lead to their being led away from him. It was a shrew political deduction, but it left God on of the picture. picture.

The people responded to the apparent interest of the king in their welfare, and worshiped at the most convenient place. Religion had met politics, and had let politics take the upper hand.

Someone has suggested that when we begin to find ways to make our religion easy, we can be cer-tain that it is the enemy of our souls who is at work. When Satan

souls who is at work. When Satan begins to be soliciteus about our welfare and suggest that it is too far to go to church, or that the weather is too cold (or too warm), etc., etc., we should be on guard. Religious ease was a big step downward for Israel, and it can be for any other nation. Where does America stand in that important matter? matter?

H. A Queen Meets a Prophet (I Kings 19:1-4, 13b-18).

Elijah under the mighty hand of God had defied the wicked king, Ahab, and his more wicked queen, Jezebel; yes, and all the prophets of Baal, and had been gloriously wintering. (I Kings 19:17-41). victorious (I Kings 18:17-41).

The queen, who was devilish in her wickedness and determination to destroy the worship of the true God, threatened the prophet. He who had met the challenge of the hundreds of prophets fied in fear before the relentless hatred of this

venomous woman.

The prophet felt that all was lost, but God revealed to him that even in that dark day there were many who were still true to Him (v. 18).

Our main interest in this lesson is not the experience of the prophet, but in seeing the cause of Israel's downfall. Here we see one great reason—every king of Israel was a wicked man. Some were better and some worse, but all of them forgot






