Catholic leaders call for peace

LONDON (AP) — Britain must make the next move toward peace if there's to be an end to IRA killing, Northern Ireland's two leading Roman Catholic politicians said Saturday.

John Hume, a nationalist who eschews violence, and Gerry Adams, president of the pro-IRA Sinn Fein, began secret talks in April to find a compromise acceptable to London and the outlawed Irish Republican Army.

Details of their proposals have not been released, but sources in both their parties have indicated that the IRA would end its campaign against British rule if London declares it has interest in withdrawing from Ireland.

In a statement faxed to The Associated Press in London, the two politicians urged Britain to take advantage of their peace initiative.



Lockheed union considers strike

FORT WORTH (AP) -Lockheed Corp.'s largest labor union met Sunday to consider whether to accept new contract terms offered by the company or to shut down the F-16 assembly line with a

Machinists District Lodge 776 had called an afternoon meeting of its 6,000 members at the Cowtown Coliseum in the Fort Worth Stockyards.

Union leaders said they would present the members with Lockheed's "best and final" offer or ask them to cast ballots on alternative actions.

Pat Lane, union president, could advise members to accept or turn down the company's proposal, extend the current contract, strike or stage a work slowdown, the Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported in its Sunday editions.



JFK spot will be commemorated as historic landmark

DALLAS (AP) — The spot in downtown Dallas where John F. Kennedy was assassinated 30 years ago is being designated as a national historic landmark.

Nellie Connally, widow of former Texas Gov. John Connally, who was seriously wounded in the Nov. 22, 1963 attack, was scheduled to make the official presentation of the plaque in midday ceremonies Monday.

The Connallys were riding in the same open-air limousine with the president and his wife when shots rang out in Dealey Plaza, on the western end of downtown Dallas.

The ceremony, open to the public, was to feature traditional American music by the Dallas Wind Symphony and gospel spirituals by a community mass choir.

Several students from Dallas public schools were to read passages from JFK's writings.

Area's playa lakes attract fowl crowd

■ Tech professor studying region's little lakes

Visitors and natives to Lubbock alike may be curious about the series of perfectly circular depressions or shining bodies of water that are evident upon flying into Lubbock International Airport.

Loren Smith has made these bodies of water, called playa lakes, a major part of his research.

Smith said the playa lakes region includes five states, covering Colorado, Kansas, to the fields and feed." Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas.

"In that region there are about 30,000 lakes," Smith said. "Two-thirds of them, or about 20,000, lakes are in Texas."

The lakes provide the best types of habitats dry soil for a while." for ducks, geese and shore birds, Smith said.

"This is one of the major flyways, or major migration regions, for waterfowl in the United States," he said. "In the southern high plains,

playas are the choice habitats for migratory such as snails and insects," he said.

■ Elderly students return to Tech classes through Seniors' Academy

Elderly residents of the Lubbock area can return to college life by participating in the Texas Tech Seniors' Academy.

"Besides being one of the more unique programs in higher education today, the Seniors' Academy is an example of Texas Tech's efforts to provide unequalled customer service to students and to the South Plains community," said Beverly

What: Texas Tech Seniors' Academy Why: The program was designed for students more than 54 years old



Thompson, coordinator of Tech's Visitor's Center. "It also is an excellent opportunity for older residents to continue their learning process."

The Seniors' Academy was established to provide a continuing education program for students 55 years of age and older.

"It's a real enrichment process," Thompson said. "It helps students to pursue an interest or a subject they might not have had the chance

to in the past." Student applicants are required to fill out simplified registration forms and do not need to have taken the Scholastic Aptitude Test or other college entrance achievement tests.

"It really only takes a few minutes to fill out the registration forms," she said.

"This is done so that the elderly will not be bogged down with the registration process and will be encouraged to apply."

Since the start of the program three years ago, 75 students have participated in the program. Students attend classes for fun and for degree purposes, Thompson

"There are no special classes for elderly students, any class is available to them" she said.

"We ease them into the mainstream and offer them regular classes and typical college enrollment and advisement procedures."

Seniors' Academy members are also offered additional counseling and tutoring. Orientation sessions are mandatory for academy member to learn about Tech facilities and student services.

"I think this program was created to give a segment of people who had interest in returning to college the chance to without a complicated registration process,"

MIAMI (AP) - Just moments after the shots that killed President Kennedy rang out in Dallas, official eyes turned toward Miami and its conspiratorial Cuban exile community.

And on the 30th anniversary of the Nov. 22, 1963 assassination, questions about the Miami connection remain unanswered.

"After 30 years, our government has still not completed a thorough investigation," says former House Assassinations Committee investigator Gaeton Fonzi.

"So the people believe everything, and they believe nothing, and they remain as confused as ever."

Law enforcement and intelligence were clearly worried about the Miami connection on the day Kennedy was shot down.

The day after Kennedy's murder, the FBI raided the home of Miami exile militant Frank Sturgis to look for evidence.

ATLANTA (AP) — With Emmitt Smith, the Dallas Cowboys didn't lose. When they lost him Sunday, they didn't win.

A bruised right quadricep ended Smith's afternoon two minutes before halftime, and the Atlanta Falcons stopped the Cowboys' sevengame winning streak 27-14.

Atlanta's swarming defense, which shut out the Los Angeles Rams last week, blanked Dallas for nearly three quarters. Deion Sanders, one of the Falcons' best defenders, also contributed on offense by catching a 70-yard touchdown pass and high-stepping to the end zone with 3:51


