

Japan lowers more business barriers

TOKYO (AP) — Two days before a deadline imposed by Washington, the Japanese government approved a plan Tuesday to open bidding on its lucrative public works to foreign programs companies.

While Japanese officials praised the plan as historic, U.S. Embassy officials reserved comment. It was not clear whether the changes would fully satisfy U.S. demands for greater access to Japan's construction market.

The plan, which takes effect April 1, calls for open, competitive bidding on major public works projects by the central government that are worth at least \$7.69 million. Bidding is to be open on projects worth at least \$25.69 million that are sponsored by public corporations.



Sun fun still may be risky, study finds

HOUSTON (AP) Smearing on a sunscreen has become a common practice for those trying to save their skin, but a study published Wednesday says it may be ineffective in preventing the most dangerous form of skin cancer.

The study, performed on mice by scientists at the University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, found sunscreens prevented sunburn, skin swelling and inflammation but not the development of melanoma.

One researcher, however, said the results should not be used as an excuse for not wearing a sunscreen. Instead, people should take extra steps to guard against the sun, she

"The take-home message is we should continue to use caution. Definitely use a sunscreen," said Dr. Cherrie Donawho, a co-author of the study, which was published Wednesday in the Journal of the National Cancer Institute.



KKK banned from Vidor project

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas Attorney General Dan Morales says he has obtained temporary restraining orders to prevent Ku Klux Klan members from getting within 500 feet of a once-again integrated public housing project in Vidor.

The orders, signed Tuesday by State District Judge John Dietz of Travis County, name the White Camelia Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and the Texas Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and their grand dragons.

Four black families were moved last week into the previously all-white housing complex, just northeast of Port Arthur. Four other black families who had been moved into the complex last year left, citing racial harassment.

The last man to leave, Bill Simpson, was shot to death hours later in what police in nearby Beaumont called a random street shooting.

■ Faculty, student leader disagree about Tech requirements

The Texas Tech Faculty Senate debated Wednesday about what some classify as an attempt to pave a road for the addition of a multiculturalism requirement.

Faculty senators discussed whether the technology requirement should be eliminated from the General Education requirements.

Associate philosophy professor Howard Curzer submitted a written motion in favor of his technology-elimination proposal.

"I think it's important to reduce the number of General Education requirements," Curzer said.

According to his proposal, Curzer believes "choosing General Education requirements is a matter of priorities."

"You ask yourself...which of the requirements that we have now are the least necessary," Curzer

A comparison study between Tech and 22 other universities regarding the number of General Education requirements was included in Curzer's proposal.



Federal housing officials felt it was wise to move four black families into the complex under the cover of darkness ... in an attempt to avoid any unpleasantness from the whites living there or elsewhere in the community.

The fact that some 18 white families in the complex gathered to welcome the new black residents around midday of their arrival gives hope that these families will now be accepted by their neighbors and be allowed to lead normal lives.

The racial hatred that has been exhibited in Vidor in the past does not have to be repeated. The unexpected welcome the new black families were given by some white residents in the complex gives reason to think that things may be changing for the better in Vidor.

As one white resident of the complex said, "We're all Americans." That sort of attitude is encouraging.

Finland reps hope to open channel to Tech

Representatives from the Hagaa Institute School of Hotel, Restaurant and Tourism Management of Helsinki, Finland received a taste of Texas during a

visit to Lubbock Wednesday. Members of the group toured the Texas Tech campus, the College of Human Sciences' education, nutrition, restaurant and hotel management department and the Tech Museum and Ranching Heritage Center.

Establishing a student exchange program between the institute and Tech was one of the main reasons for the visit.

"Our institute is one of the leading restaurant and hotel management schools in Finland," said Antti Halli, president of the Haaga Institute. "We are internationally recognized and very interested in having student and teacher exchanges between these schools."

The institute began an exchange program last year and hosts 22 students from different countries. Cornell University and Louisiana State University already have established exchange programs with the insti-

CBS wins rights to '98 Winter games

NEW YORK (AP) - Declaring that CBS still is in the sports business, network president Larry Tisch confirmed Wednesday that CBS paid a record \$375 million for U.S. TV rights to its third straight Winter Olympics.

"We lost football, but we're certainly committed to sports, and CBS will be there every Saturday and Sunday with sports programming," Tisch said at a news conference.

The high pricetag for the 1998 Games in Nagano, Japan would have been surprising, even if CBS had been forced into a bidding war.

The network was the lone bidder after NBC, ABC and Fox quit the process either out of lack of interest or other considerations, said Richard Pound of Canada, a vice president of the International Olympic Committee. None of the three actually made a bid.

Fox was the last to drop out on Friday, Pound said.

"We think it's a fair number. It's a number we can live with," Tisch said.

Pound said the figure was within the parameters both sides set prior to entering final negotiations over the week-




