Reporters may face legal action

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) - As Egypt's battle with Muslim radicals intensifies, the Interior Ministry warned on Tuesday of possible legal action against foreign reporters over what it considers overblown coverage of extremist attacks.

The warning underscores Egypt's effort to reassure tourists about the country's safety following radical threats against foreign tourists and investors.

Tourism has been hard hit by the militants' fight to replace Egypt's secular government with strict Islamic rule. Nearly 300 people have died in extremist-related violence in the past two years.

Jackson found innocent in 'Dangerous' case

DENVER (AP) - For the second time in as many months, Michael Jackson was exonerated Tuesday in a lawsuit that accused him of stealing someone else's song.

It took a U.S. District Court jury 3 1/2 hours to find Jackson innocent of copyright infringement for his hit "Dangerous," as the Denver songwriter, Crystal Cartier, alleged in a lawsuit.

Cartier said Jackson stole her song after hearing a demonstration tape. She said she wrote it in 1985, revised it a few years later, copyrighted it in fall 1991 and gave a tape of it to a Jackson aide in 1988.

Jackson took the stand Monday and testified that he wrote "Dangerous" in 1990 while listening to the bass track from another of his songs. He said no one helped him write it and denied ever hearing Cartier's song before she filed her lawsuit.



State touts video job hunting tools

AUSTIN (AP) - People around Texas will be able to get state employment information at shopping malls and grocery stores through touch-activated video screens in a pilot program that's being touted by Gov. Ann Richards.

The Texas Employment Commission and Californiabased North Communications plan to put in 50 kiosks with screens over the next three months. Fifteen will be placed in the next few days in Austin, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, McAllen, Port Arthur and Tyler.

"Info-Texas will help connect Texans who are still looking for work to the jobs that can make a difference to them and to their families and to our economy," Richards said Tues-

The kiosks — which combine elements of the computer, television and automated teller machines - use video and graphics to provide TEC information and services. They can be used in Spanish or English.



Search ends

■ Four candidates named for dean of Texas Tech's College of Education

Four candidates for the dean of Texas Tech's College of Education have been named, ending a nationwide search that began last year.

"We have a short list of four people that we have invited to campus for interviews," said Martin Harms, dean of the College of Architecture and search committee coordinator. "However, we have not contacted the applicants we have chosen and confirmed their acceptance for an interview yet."

Various members of the search committee solicited names through education faculty members and

"We sent letters to about 700 schools," he said. "It was a nationwide search. I don't think there were many schools east or west that didn't receive an inquiry."

Search committee members include College of Education and College of Arts and Sciences faculty


"There were certain criteria listed for what type of person we were looking for to fill this position," Harms said. "There were specific qualifications but no tight requirements."

Applicants are expected to be experienced in undergraduate and graduate levels of education, in providing leadership in the form of development in teacher education programs in field-based situations and in professional schools and in understanding the role of research in the college.

Individuals also are expected to meet the demands of constant changes and reform in the education field, to build support and external funding for endowment and to be able to work with others of *diverse backgrounds.

Harms said the committee received about 46 applicants.



Music shooting star Jackson falls with fans

During the brief vogue for the movie "Indecent Proposal" last year, couples nationwide argued who looked like any other about whether it was right for a woman to sleep with Robert Redford in exchange for a million bucks.

My wife and I never resolved this issue — we wouldn't mind a house in the country, actually but since the offer wasn't on our table, we pressed on.

Yet until the nasty whispers started spreading, few debated the wisdom of real-life parents who turned over their children to Michael Jackson in exchange for shopping sprees at Toys 'R' Us, special Disneyland tours and overnights at Neverland Ranch, a sort of Playboy Mansion for

Jackson, by far a bigger star than Robert Redford, couldn't possibly be up to no good.

Star worship is the real story in the Jackson case. Americans of all stations are infatuated with the rich and famous, and the most rabid fans will surrender almost anything — from their money to their dignity, principles and children — to brush vicariously against their idols.

The weirder Jackson's public persona, the more famous he

became and the larger the rewards he received.

As a young pop performer wholesome child star, he was merely another show-biz celebrity. As a man in his 30s with a crotch-clutching MTV pose, a cosmetically rearranged face, unnaturally chalky skin and a personality so androgynous that even Ru Paul might find it a bit much, he was our Sun King.

From the president on down, few could resist sharing his spotlight. Only a year ago Clinton beamed into the television cameras at an inaugural gala with Jackson on one side and his daughter, Chelsea, on the other. It was also a year ago that Jackson was given center stage at into question, his fame reached an American institution even more popular than the presidency, the Super Bowl, where he cavorted for 91 million viewers at halftime.

Jackson is a talented performer, but it's hard to imagine that either Bill Clinton or a typical football fan sits around listening to "Dangerous."

The reflected glory of fame, even when reflected on the already celebrated, is the drawing card, and no one seems immune to it.

After Jackson was embroiled in scandal, he spent New Year's hanging around with Michael Milken, the star felon of the 1980s, at the Treasure Island resort in Las Vegas; the fallen junk bond prince, looking as always for public-relations redemption, had allied himself with Jackson to create an educational cable network for the nation's kids.

A week later, and less than three weeks before Jackson bought his way out of the civil case, the NAACP Image Awards gave him a prestigious platform from which to declare his innocence.

Once Jackson settled out of court and threw his innocence new heights. Instead of just sharing the spotlight with the president, he upstaged him.

As startled news junkies discovered Tuesday night, "Nightline" bumped the State of the Union address for a dissection of the Jackson case.

An apologetic Ted Koppel, not previously known as a devotee of pop culture, exclaimed: "After you strip away the sleaze, there are still a couple of issues worth talking about."

Maybe. But, those issues, legal

and psychological, are secondary to the apparently irresistible pull of Jackson's fame. Watching his story unfold, I couldn't help but think of John Guare's "Six Degrees of Separation," in which wealthy Manhattanites are so enamored of celebrity that they turn over their homes to a con man who purports to be Sidney Poitier's son and promises them a role in the movie of "Cats."

Now that the 14-year-old son of a "Beverly Hills dentist and part-time screenwriter" has hit a jackpot large enough to finance his own "Cats" after allegedly sharing a bed with Jackson, Guare's satire seems tame.

As Susan Estrich, a USC law professor, put it in one of the countless discussions I guiltily devoured on CNN, the Jackson story "leaves everyone wanting to take a shower, quite frankly."

But what leaves everyone feeling soiled may not be just the ambiguous relationship between Jackson and his young playmate but the unambiguously titillating relationship between this fallen star and ourselves.

The Dallas Morning News on Hutchison trial:

As it turned out, the trial of Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison was over as soon as it began. In an abrupt turn of events, state Judge John Onion issued a directed verdict that not only ended the current trial on ethics charges, but meant the Texas senator could not be retried on the same charges.

Although the tangle of legal procedures may be difficult to sort out, several political realities were clear. For Sen. Hutchison, it was the political equivalent of winning the Super Bowl before taking the field. She has earned admiration for standing firm. It should dramatically boost her political fortunes.

For Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle, the dismissal was a major disappointment. His competence as a prosecuting attorney is now in question, as it should be. How could an experienced prosecutor bungle the acquisition of evidence in such a highprofile case?

Mr. Earle, of course, says he had no choice but to drop his case. Technicalities were against him, he says.

But after dragging Sen. Hutchison's reputation through the mud, and allowing Texas' Washington reputation to suffer, he couldn't deliver. ...

Fort Worth Star-Telegram on Hutchison trial:

Justice was savaged in the stark denouement that shocked a Tarrant County courtroom yesterday in the abrupt conclusion of the trial of U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison.

A directed verdict of acquittal on charges of state ethics violations smashed the last feeble, tottering underpinnings of a bungled prosecution that squandered time, money and diminished public faith in a system of justice free of the corrupting infestation of rank politics.

Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle and his team of prosecutors were unceremoniously vanquished by their own errors. Now Earle has before him a solemn duty to make an accounting to the people of Texas. ...

Earle's record of securing convictions for official misconduct under his Public Integrity Unit is spotty. In high-profile cases, he failed to indict former Comptroller Bob Bullock and lost at trial against former Attorney General Jim Mattox. Former Speaker Gib Lewis pleaded to a misdemeanor.

If ethics laws are so difficult to enforce, the Legislature should draft new ones that are clear and tough and have sufficient teeth to allow effective prosecution of offenders. ...

The News Messenger (Marshall) on **Hutchison trial:**

The bizarre ending last week to the trial of U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison serves only to keep her career in limbo.

She was accused by fellow Republicans in the Texas treasurer's office she held at the time of using her staff and equipment, especially telephones and computers, for the benefit of her election

Due to some fantastic legal maneuvering, Judge John F. Onion Jr. ordered a jury to find Hutchison innocent of the ethics violations charges. District Attorney Ronnie Earle decided against pursuing the prosecution when it became apparent that he couldn't get Onion to rule before the trial on whether evidence — computer records would be found admissible.

The evidence has been seized from the treasurer's office without a search warrant.

Hutchison's supporters are claiming exoneration on the verge of the party primary election.

They sweep aside the fact that Earle wasn't making up these allegations up from thin air, that two grand juries felt there was sufficient reason to indict the senator, and that the "innocent" verdict comes not from an objective trial involving the evidence, but from sharp legal maneuvering.

The allegations will continue to cling to Sen. Hutchison like hair spray. ...


Davis missed his second shot and the game ended with a near miss from three-point range by SMU guard Troy Matthews.




