#### U.S. fighters down Serbian warplanes

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia (AP) — NATO struck for the first time in the Bosnian war Monday when two U.S. F-16 fighter jets downed four Serb warplanes that U.N. officials said bombed an arms plant run by Bosnia's Muslim-led government.

NATO said the planes ignored several warnings to leave a U.N.-imposed no-fly zone over Bosnia or face attack and then were observed dropping bombs on a Muslim-controlled area.

Bosnian Serbs first denied involvement. One Serb army official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, confirmed that four of their planes were shotdown. Bosnian Serbleader Radovan Karadzic said Serb pilots might have been making 'training flights."

#### Jury sequestered in slaying case

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) -A dozen jurors and two alternates were seated and immediately sequestered Sunday in the trial of an activist accused of murdering an abortion doc-

The trial of Michael F. Griffin was set to resume Monday and was expected to last an additional seven days. Circuit Judge John Parnham wants to keep the panel sequestered for the duration to shelter jurors from publicity about the case.

Defense lawyers and prosecutors had tentatively agreed on the jury of seven women and five men and the two alternates, both women, Saturday night. They were selected following four days of individual interviews.

Griffin, 32, an anti-abortion activist and former Pensacola chemical plant worker, is accused of shooting Dr. David Gunn, 47, of Eufaula, Ala., three times in the back last March 10.



#### A&M's compliance with law questioned

DALLAS (AP) — Officials at Texas A&M University asked the Texas attorney general for permission to withhold from the public an internal audit of one of the university's departments - apparently before they even knew whether the report existed.

The incident is the most recent in a legacy of battles over the public's access to the school, The Dallas Morning News reported Monday.

Attorney General Dan Morales' office on Feb. 15 ordered the audit of the university's

food service division released. Friday, 10 days after the attorney general's mandate, university officials said there was no audit to release. Later in the day, a spokesman concluded the audit does exist. However, contrary to provisions of state open government laws, he said he would not release it until A&M lawyers reviewed it.

"It gives them the added edge because they have already had the experience working with faculty members and visiting a health sciences center," Shive said.



## Haiti: An embargo in the dark

The lights come on, sort of, around 2 o'clock each morning in the Port-au-Prince office of the National Coalition for Haitian Refugees. It's a dim and feeble effort and it doesn't last long. By 4 a.m. the electrical power to the coalition's office is exhausted and the lights go out for the remainder of the day.

Because of an international oil embargo, Haitians get only about two hours of electricity a day. It's almost as if an entire country of 7 million people were living in a permanent blackout. When the sun goes down, the increasingly demoralized population is consigned to a dreary and fearful darkness.

It's an old story, and not many are taking notice, but the Haitians are suffering. In addition to the international oil and weapons embargo, the Organization of American States has imposed a trade embargo and other sanctions on Haiti.

The collective impact has been devastating. Most public transportation has come to a halt. Hospitals have virtually shut down, businesses are failing, farmers cannot get to market and relief agencies are finding it virtually impossible through. Contraband fuel, to reach the masses of the poor who are in need.

"You can't do anything with two hours of electricity a Dominican Republic. day," said Jocelyn McCalla, the coalition's executive director. "And without transportation you can't get anywhere. You can't do anything to help people."

The point of the embargoes, supposedly, was to bring the gangster government of Lt. Gen. Raoul Cedras to its knees, thus leading to the restoration of Haiti's legitimately elected president, the Rev. Jean-Bertrand Aristie.

However much desired, this is not happening. The army's headquarters, which is bargo. opposite Haiti's gleaming white Presidential Palace in downtown Port-au-Prince, has plenty of electricity, plenty of lights and plenty of

And then there are the exemptions in the trade embargo for the "assembly sector" - companies that ship component parts into Haiti, where they are assembled into commercial products by cheap labor and exported.

These exemptions are being used by many companies to order enormous amounts of goods under the guise of necessary supplies. These "supplies" then find their way to third parties in Haiti, often friends of the military, thus undermining the em-

Extensive documentation of instances in which companies abused the exemptions was submitted to the U.S. Treasury Department in 1992 by Antoine Izmery, a prominent Haitian businessman.

No action was taken. Last Sept. 11, Izmery, an outspoken supporter of Father Aristide, was dragged from a church in Port-au-

As the suffering in Haiti increases, there are calls for an expanded embargo. But to what end? Without closing existing loopholes, what

purpose would a more severe embargo serve?

Or rather, whose purpose? The paramount goal of the United States' Haitian policy apparently is to keep out the Haitian refugees. Despite protests to the contrary, it's not at all clear that the Clinton administration even wants Aristide to return to power.

The Haitian president has been bullied and belittled and harassed by administration officials, and President Clinton himself has described Aristide's future as "clouded."

Without complete support for Aristide, what is the point of any embargo? It will be very difficult to justify an expanded embargo if steps are not first taken to improve what's already in place, and to show specifically how the new and bigger version will lead to the ouster of Cedras and the reinstatement of Aristide.

When you impose additional suffering on people who are already in pain, you ought to have clear and exceptionally good reasons for doing so.

Code enforcements and handling code problems were addressed during the Heart of Lubbock's neighborhood association meeting Monday.

Rick Derr, local codes inspector, presented the program and said that, as far as housing goes, there are items that can qualify the housing structure as haz-

"If it is unoccupied and open and accessible, it is a hazard," Derr said.

An example of an "open and accessible" house includes one that has broken windows or kicked-in doors.

Back-yard apartments, storage sheds and garages are susceptible to the same "hazardous" labeling if the structure is deemed "open and accessible," he

Junk vehicles also pose a problem in neighborhoods, Derr said.

To be labeled a junk vehicle, the auto must be inoperative with an expired inspection sticker or expired license plate.

"If a vehicle just has an expired that doesn't mean it's inoperable," Derr said.



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

Under the plan, the state would have control over setting student standards. State officials would measure results, administer the state's school finance system, provide technical and administrative support for local districts, make sure eligible school children are educated and monitor and assist non-performing school districts.

School districts not electing the Home Rule system would continue to follow rules in the Texas Education Code.

"If you have great financial stability, you have a greater chance for educational stability," Grimes said. "Stability would ensure that youngsters are getting a better education."
