### **NATO** jets flying again after attack

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — A NATO jet swooped over a besieged northern town Sunday after Bosnian state radio claimed Serb warplanes destroyed a bridge in an attack similar to the one that provoked NATO retaliation.

With Serb troops barring access to Maglaj, there was no way for NATO or U.N. officials to visit the site to check the claim that planes attacked the Muslim-held town about 40 miles north of Sarajevo. But NATO officers raised questions about the report.

Squadron Leader John Jeffries, a NATO spokesman in Naples, Italy, said early warning aircraft did not detect any air attack on Maglaj. 'If we had, we would have taken action," he said.



### Victim of bridge shooting dies

NEW YORK (AP) - A Hasidic Jew who was left braindead after a man opened fire on a van full of rabbinical students died Saturday.

Aaron Halberstam, 16, was one of four students wounded Tuesday on the Brooklyn Bridge when a lone gunman opened fire on a van carrying the students. A Lebanese man was charged in the shootings; police say he is not linked to any terrorist group.

Halberstam was pronounced brain dead on Wednesday. He was pronounced dead Saturday night at St. Vincent's Hospital, spokeswoman Dina Gabriel said.

Halberstam was among hundreds of ultra-Orthodox Lubavitcher Hasidic Jews who traveled from the borough of Brooklyn Tuesday to pray for the sect's 91-year-old spiritual leader, Menachem Schneerson, who had undergone cataract surgery at a hospital in Manhattan.



### Rival klans rally against each other

WACO (AP) — The head of an offshoot group of the Ku Klux Klan railed Saturday against the leaders of a rival white supremacist organization, warning them to "resign or die."

Robert Spence of Boyd, who identified himself as imperial wizard of the True Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, led a group of 14 in a protest on the McLennan County Courthouse steps against Michael Lowe, grand dragon of the Waco-based Knights of the Ku

Spence said his amalgam of longtime klansmen, skinheads and neo-Nazis began an attempt to oust two leaders of the True Knights of the Ku Klux Klan — the only national Klan organization 1eft in the United States - about six weeks ago after a year of disagreement. Spence said Lowe stole from members of the Knights and did not pay taxes on goods sold by the Klan.

# Lady Raiders sweep title away from Aggies

For part of the first half Saturday, the game between Texas Tech and Texas A&M lived up to its billing.

But in the end, only the Lady Raiders held up their share of the pre-game hype.

The Lady Raiders used a 25-3 run in the middle of the first half to propel them to a 109-75 win over the Lady Aggies in front of 8,574 at the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum.

The win gives No. 6 Tech a 12-2 Southwest Conference record, and its third consecutive SWC title.

"This was one of the neatest wins of my career," Tech head coach Marsha Sharp said after the game. "We had a great team last year, and we needed to come back this year and prove we have a great program. I am just thrilled that they got to be SWC champs."

The Lady Raiders will focus their sights on this week's Dr Pepper SWC Post-Season Classic which begins Wednesday in Moody Coliseum in Dallas. Tech will be the No. 1 seed and will play at 6 p.m. against No. 8 seeded Texas Christian.

"Our attack has gotten steadily better the past month," Sharp said. "We were a lot more aggressive with the basketball today. We were taking much better shots and getting the ball to the open person."

Tech shot 59.2 percent from the field against the Lady Aggies, but one of the differences was the three-point shooting of Noel Johnson and LeKisha Wiley.

The Tech duo combined for nine three-pointers in Aggies a 22-19 advantage. 12 attempts, hitting seven in the first half.






### VALUES DON'T CHANGE WITH TIME

I write in response to guest columnist Kenneth Bobo's article

"Aids Education Needs New Attitude."
