

Nixon at Kremlin

MOSCOW (AP) - A peeved President Boris Yeltsin froze Richard Nixon out of the Kremlin on Wednesday, complaining about the hard-line Communist company the former president has been keeping.

Nixon's meetings with Yeltsin and other government officials were all canceled as a result of his talks with Yeltsin opponents, particularly the man who proclaimed himself Russian president during last October's uprising.

Then Yeltsin really got nasty: He took away the bodyguards and black Zil limousine his government had put at Nixon's disposal. He did the same thing two years ago to another former president who angered him, Mikhail Gorbachev.

Yeltsin said his snub should be no surprise.

White House prepares for jury

WASHINGTON (AP) President Clinton told aides to "be very open" Wednesday, a day before they faced grand jury questioning in the probe of possible meddling in the Whitewater investigation. The special prosecutor pleaded on Capitol Hill for Republicans to hold off their own hearings.

With aides summoned to testify on Thursday, the White House bundled relevant papers for prosecutors. The appearances of at least two of President Clinton's closest aides - Bruce Lindsey and Harold Ickes - were postponed.

Special prosecutor Robert B. Fiske called the Clinton administration "very responsive and cooperative" after trying to persuade Republicans to delay congressional hearings until he completes his inquiry into whether the White House attempted to influence the investigation.

He said he planned to finish that part of his inquiry within a few months, after which he would have no objections to hearings.



"We just wanted to try to give everyone the chance to know how dangerous drinking and driving is, especially over the holidays," said Sharon Favors, a senior political science major from Dallas and sergeant at arms for Delta Sigma Theta.

Hosting the event before spring break made it more effective, said Adrienne Malone, a junior family studies major from Amarillo and vice president of Delta Sigma Theta.

Responsible driving while on road trips was one point the program was attempting to convey to students, Favors said.

"Most people may not drink, but may have friends who do drink," she said. "We just want them to be responsible."

James Oswalt, crime prevention officer for the University Police Department, said it is important for people who are traveling to take breaks to increase alertness to spot drunken drivers.

Oswalt said the UPD is available to provide educational programs to students.

"We are always willing to do programs to help get students' attention to what is going on," he said.

Favors said she believes the event was successful and in the future, more organizations will be added to increase awareness.





Food and Drug Administration ANNA recently set a fire QUINDLEN beneath one of America's most

pernicious public health issues. But he said Congress must decide how to put the fire out knowing full well that many elected officials will want only to ignore the smoke and go about their business-as-usual.

The subject was tobacco, and in a letter to an anti-smoking activist Dr. Kessler raised the possibility that cigarettes may be embraced a ban and willingly considered drug-delivery devices, subject to FDA regulation. The added twist is this: Given what we know about the health hazards, if the FDA regulated cigarettes it would have no choice but to ban them.

In a single piece of correspondence, the commissioner took the debate over sale, use and regulation to a different and more honest level than it has been taken by government before, even by the worthy and welcome pronouncements of recent Surgeon Generals. Kessler's letter came at the end of a week that will surely live in infamy within the tobacco industry. The Journal of the American Medical Association published a study linking cigarettes designed for and marketed to women with a sharp increase two decades ago in smoking by teen-age girls. And in the annual surgeon general's report, Joycelyn Elders was withering in her criticism of advertising that plays upon teenagers' need to be cool and target kids to replenish the ranks of smokers killed off by cancer.

There was something a little same-old-same-old about all this fuss over advertising. Although the industry has been insisting for years that it doesn't target

women or kids, anyone who's seen a Virginia Slims or Joe Camel billboard understands that that's preposterous.

Besides, Dr. Elders knows as well as I do how to get rid of cigarette advertising. It is to run counter-advertising.

Most Americans probably believe that there are no longer tobacco ads on radio and TVbecause the brave souls of the Congress banned them, which is nominally true. What really happened is that after three years of vivid counter-advertising in the late '60s — remember "the next time your wife wants a cigarette, give her a kiss instead"? - the tobacco industry retired from an arena in which the truth was far more powerful than Madison Avenue palaver.

Kessler's letter and his decision to publicly raise the question of FDA regulation of tobacco products makes all others subsidiary issues. And his contention that

tobacco manufacturers may be adding nicotine to make cigarettes more addictive brings us back to a central question. Whether talking about addiction, taxation or education, there is always at the center of the conversation an essential conundrum: How come we're selling this deadly stuff anyway?

(Industry representatives say that there is no nicotine added to cigarettes. They are the same people who say there is no real evidence that cigarettes cause cancer. For what it's worth.)

Perhaps the greatest bar to an outright ban on cigarettes is the American aversion to prohibition, to everything from the black market it creates to the governmental control over individual choice it presumes But the tobacco industry also constitutes one of the nation's most powerful political lobbies. It accounts directly for nearly 700,000 American jobs.

About 46 million Americans smoke today, and those smokers

would pose a formidable problem if cigarettes were ever to be banned. Cigarette manufacturers insist that their products is not addictive; those who have tried to quit will tell you something quite different.

Canny Dr. Kessler, in saying he seeks advice from Congress on how to proceed, has sent its members a puzzle that defies simple solutions. Like a philosophy problem it unfolds: the FDA could most likely claim jurisdiction over cigarettes because nicotine is an addictive drug. But the FDA has so far not done so.

An it has not done so because, if it did, the FDA would have to ban cigarettes as unacceptably hazardous. Which they so clearly are. A pretty problem. It will be interesting to see what, if anything, Congress makes of it, or if its members will merely let the fire Dr. Kessler lighted die down again.
