Lansky and the Imperial Wizard Lansky and the Imp
of the Ku Klux Klan.
Good for the Jews were Adlai Stevenson, Abba Eban, Steve Roosevelt and Sammy Davis Jr. About the only public personin my grandmother's eyes, was Elizabeth Taylor, when she converted to Judaism to marry Eddie Fisher after stealing him from Debbie Reynolds. Was this good for the Jews or bad? Though de-
bated with Talmudic intensity up to the intrusion of Richard Burton, the issue was never resolved.
