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North Korea warns **United States to** not forget past

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - Stepping up its rhetorical offensive, North Korea warned the United States on Wednesday not to forget the lessons of the Korean War. South Korea put its 650,000 troops on special alert.

The South Korean military was ordered to cancel leaves and keep commanders at their posts. Land, sea, and aerial patrols were increased, officials said.

While the militaries of both Koreas are frequently put on alert, Wednesday's order was a higher level than usual and took on special significance as North Korea grows increasingly belligerent over accusations it is developing nuclear weapons. The move expanded an alert ordered by President Kim Young-sam at an emergency national security meeting Monday.



Book says China has nuclear weapons, missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) -China has about 450 nuclear weapons and is striving to develop more modern long-range missiles that would be mobile, carry multiple warheads and

notice, according to a new book. The authors, who studied the secretive Chinese nuclear

program for several years, said China's focus is on qualitative improvements, and the number of weapons in the Chinese arsenal is unlikely to grow for the foreseeable future.

The book, sponsored by the Natural Resources Defense Council, a private environmental group opposed to nuclear arms development, is the most detailed published account yet of the origins and status of the Chinese, British and French nuclear programs.



University of Texas orders audit after drug charges

AUSTIN (AP) - Following charges that a drug ring made large quantities of methamphetamine with school-bought supplies, the University of Texas has ordered an audit of campus operations that buy, store and dispense chemicals.

UT officials want to determine whether they have "any other potential problems or weaknesses at other locations on campus," said G. Charles Franklin, vice president for business affairs.

The main storeroom for chemicals at UT's chemistry and biochemistry department is at the center of a federal probe following the drug-related arrests this month of the storeroom supervisor, a former storeroom employee and a third man.

Drug Enforcement Administration officials allege that the speed ring supplied, among others, the Hell's Angels motorcycle gang.







Tabula Rasa will return to Lubbock April 16 as part of its Midwest tour.




