

WASHINGTON (AP) -Contending Republicans planned to "create a donnybrook," the chairman of the House Banking Committee on Monday defended his cancellation of what would have been the first House Whitewater hearings.

"I'm not interested in protecting anyone ... only in preserving the integrity of the committee," Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez of San Antonio told a news conference, adding that he never talked to the White House about the hearings.

Gonzalez' action has no impact on the broad, Whitewater hearings the House voted to hold if the bipartisan leadership agrees on a time and format.



The Texas Forest Service decided not to file a case against Texas Tech range and wildlife students after concluding an investigation of the Bird Creek Fire.

"Our law enforcement officer did investigate the incident," said Bobby Young, head of the fire control department for the Texas Forest Service in Lufkin. "It didn't warrant filing a case because of the equipment and manpower they had."

Young said the Forest Service looked at a copy of the burn plan. and said the plan lists items such as the water prescription called for, the adequate number of personnel on the scene and the adequate amount of equipment on the scene.

Young said damage to the land and fences was minor compared to the cost and effort it took to put the fire out.

Costs included the money state agencies spent on helicopter use and the money the volunteer fire departments spent, he said.

The wildfire, which developed March 19 after a prescribed burning by Texas Tech range and wildlife students went out of control, burned about 35,000 acres.

"What they did was definitely a bad deal," Young said.

"We are hoping that people will realize the volatile nature of the fuels."

Young said if the landowners or any of the volunteer fire departments required monetary compensation, it would be a civil matter.

"We don't offer any kind of damage assessment, we enforce the penal part of it," he said. "We don't have any control over that."

However, he said the land owners did not seem too concerned about the damage.

"Our law enforcement officer told me that they didn't seem too upset," he said.

Young said he was not sure how the fire could have been prevented.

"Every time you go out to do a prescribed burning, every day is different," Young said. "Prescribed burning is a lot more than lighting

Dallas police said the officer's record has been cleared. Since the department began random drug testing, 2,265 officers have been screened, with the tests revealing no serious drug abuse. However, four officers had taken prescription medications belonging to friends or relatives, officials said.



Victoria Advocate on new hazardous waste regulations:

The Clinton administration has taken a welcome approach to a shameful practice of exporting hazardous waste, primarily to Third World countries. ...

Carol Browner, Environmental Protection Agency administrator, struck the right tones when she said at a press conference on the new policy: "Citizens in other countries should not be asked to bear the burden of U.S. pollution."

The administration has broken with the policies of the Reagan and Bush administrations by agreeing to ask Congress to pass a law that would ratify the 5-year-old Basel convention on exports of hazardous waste.

This is the kind of policy change that should help Americans realize that no longer will it be acceptable for their country to ship the effluent of their affluent lives to countries too poor to say no. ...

Such a change should be healthy news for this country. It should help to create new technologies while safeguarding the environment at home and abroad.

The Clinton administration deserves praise for wanting to make American business a more responsible member of the world community.

San Angelo Standard-Times on casino gambling:

The horses haven't been running for long. The lottery is still a bit of a novelty. And now Texans may be getting ready to decide whether to allow casino gambling in their state. ...

Proponents emphasize the economic benefits. They have a point: Texans spend more than \$1 billion a year in Las Vegas, and newly available riverboat gambling in Louisiana draws 70 percent of its business from Texas.

Much of that money could stay here, backers say, and tourism could be boosted, if Texas offered casino and riverboat gambling.

But supporters should be careful about promoting casino gambling as an economic savior.

Gambling revenues are not stable or dependable, and much of the money casinos would bring in would simply be taken from a different gambling pocket — which is why horse racing interests will be spending money to defeat casinos.

If Texas does allow casino gambling, it should be strictly limited. While a sound argument can be made that it would add to the attraction of certain tourism spots, particularly along the coast, the idea of slot machines in airports and blackjack dealers in motels throughout the state is hardly thrilling.
